Welcome to our nature trail

The trail begins outside the administration building and covers a distance of approximately 2km. We estimate it will take between 1 – 2 hours to complete at a leisurely pace. Interpretation boards giving information on the natural environment can be found throughout the trail. Each board is marked on the map with a symbol.

The route passes through woodland, grassland and lowland heath. We are allowing some

Summer

- Look out for the rare silver-studded
 blue butterfly
- Nightjars can be heard 'churring' on the heath at dusk
- Grass snakes can be spotted swimming across the pond

Autumn

 Admire the rich, gold and crimson hues of autumn leaves Please follow these simple guidelines to ensure your visit is a pleasant and safe experience:

- Children must be accompanied by an adult at all times and should be supervised, especially near the pond
- This site contains the natural flora, fauna and wildlife that is common in this area, including potentially hazardous creatures such as adders
- The ground level is uneven in places, so please tread carefully

areas to revert to wildflower meadows which will improve over time.

Seasonal highlights

Spring

- Listen out for chiffchaffs, blackcaps and cuckoos
- Enjoy the beautiful spring flowers
- Spot adders and grass snakes emerging from hibernation
- Hear woodpeckers drumming on trees

- Look out for stags arriving for the rut or mating season
- Spot different types of fungi

Winter

- Huge flocks of starlings spin and twirl in the dusk sky before settling down to roost
- Great grey shrikes visit for the winter before heading back to Scandinavia
- Grey squirrels search for buried food stores
- Great tits form large flocks with other tits to scour the countryside for food

- There are no surfaced paths, so unfortunately the trail is not suitable for those in wheelchairs
- Parts of the trail get very muddy after rainfall, so it is advisable to wear wellingtons or walking boots
- Please protect plants and animals and take your litter home
- Smoking, barbeques and fires are forbidden
