Lucky is a very Lucky kitten!

On Tuesday 30th June we received a phone call from a lady to say she saw a cat walk up her drive followed by 3 little kittens. The cat family then moved into a hedge between her garden and a sheep field next door. The lady made enquiries with her nearest neighbours (a rural area) but no-one had a cat nor knew of anyone with a cat so she assumed the cats may have been abandoned and started to feed them. I took 2 cat traps round to her that afternoon and got a phone call early the next morning to say she had caught the mother. I promptly went and collected the cat, put her in my cat pen and then returned with the trap. On my return, 1 of the kittens was in the other trap and another hanging around outside. So I transferred the trapped kitten to a basket, reset the trap and retreated to my van and waited. Half an hour later, I had one more kitten with no sign of the third, so I took both kittens back home, having reset both traps.

It was only when I went in the cat pen with the kittens that I discovered the mother wasn't abandoned but was actually a full blown feral! I just about got out of her pen without any injuries and decided to put the kittens in the second pen. The next morning, another relieved phone call from the lady to say the last kitten was caught. So I collected the kitten, retrieved both traps and put the kitten in with her siblings.

On the Friday, I had the mother neutered and relocated to a lovely farm where she can happily live as a farm cat.

Just when we thought that was the end of the story, I get a frantic call from the lady on Monday 6th June to say she had heard another kitten! I rushed back round with another trap and we could clearly hear the kitten respond to our calls but it was on the other side of the hedge in the field and I was very concerned that it may be too weak to climb the bank into the garden.

Having got the farmer's permission we went around and set the trap near a fox den where we believed he may be hiding. Unfortunately, despite my searching for him the next day and the lady constantly calling him, we didn't hear another peep from him and assumed the worst. Then, miraculously the lady discovered him in the trap late that evening!

So somehow this little 7 week old kitten survived for 8 days on his own, which is why I named him Lucky, and I must say, he was none the worse for wear and even more unexpected, he is really friendly and affectionate which is more than can be said for his siblings!

A guide to our new hands-free homing process

We're keen to help as many cats as possible, both during the current crisis and beyond. Offering our cats a home will help to free up more space to take in emergency cases.

We have put in extensive procedures to make sure that our homing process is in line with the current government guidance, without putting adoptees or volunteers at risk.

Here is our guide to adopting a cat using hands-free homing.

- Check you are within a reasonable distance of your chosen branch. You can find your nearest branch by typing in your postcode at www.cats.org.uk/find-us
- Enquire. If you've found a cat on our website that you're interested in homing, send an enquiry through using our form.
- Reserve your cat. If you're found to be a match for your chosen cat, you'll be contacted by one of our volunteers.
 You may be asked for proof of consent from your landlord, to have a cat (if you live in a rented property).
- Adopt. Once you have reserved your cat, you'll be sent paperwork to sign and you will make a further telephone appointment with our team. In this call, you'll have a chance to discuss everything you need to know about your cat. You'll then pay an adoption fee, usually by bank transfer.
- **Bringing your cat home.** Once this is finalised, we'll arrange for a driver to bring your cat safely to your home.
