Meet the Cats Protection team

Marina Veal has been a volunteer for Cats Protection in Bury St Edmunds and Stowmarket since 2002 and is currently Welfare Office of our branch.

Marina deals with new admissions, lost and found cats, Cats Protection enquiries, is also is a fosterer with two pens, and undertakes home checking for prospective homes.



How did you get involved with Cats Protection?

I started off by collecting and dropping off cat food and delivering it to Bradfield St George when the late Pat Greenhalgh was in charge. When our branch regrouped in 2002 I saw an advert for cat fosterers for the Cats Protection and I though that I may be able to help and have been a fosterer ever since. This led me to undertaking many other positions such as homing officer, admissions, fundraising, home checking and now I am admissions Officer and Fosterer.

Where does your love of cats come from?

I have always loved animals, as a young girl I was rescuing insects, wildlife and all and sundry. Cats became my passion, which has led to me taking on my own cats, these were often feral and disadvantaged cats that would otherwise have found it difficult to be rehomed. I have had many wonderful feline companions.









What are you most proud of in terms of the branch's achievements?

One of my greatest joys is taking a cat into my care that has had a very difficult life so far and giving them the love, time and attention to overcome their psychological problems. To see the cats flourish and learn to trust people again is amazing and allows them to be able to find a loving and forever home.



What is the most challenging aspect of your work?

Hearing about cats that we are unable to help as we don't have the space to bring them into our care, there are so many that need assistance. The amount of feral and stray cats around is challenging, Cats Protection do their best to neuter the cats that they can but if only people would take time to neuter their cats it would help.

Although what I do for Cats Protection can be hard work it's the best feeling when the right cat goes to the right home and we know that they will have a happy and fulfilled life.

Some notes to help keep your cat safe at Christmas

Christmas is coming! Everyone wants a safe, happy Christmas for people and pets, so here are some tips to make sure your cat enjoys Christmas as much as you do ... and avoid that Christmas morning trip to the vet!

Christmas Trees & decorations

Some cats regard Christmas trees as a playground. Others are pretty much uninterested. A nimble, careful cat may climb the tree in perfect safety, but just to be on the safe side, think carefully about where you put your tree and what you put on it.



Chocolate contains a stimulant called theobromine, a bit like caffeine, it's severely poisonous to cats.

Cooked bones

Once cooked, all bones become brittle and splinter easily which can pierce your cat's digestive tract or cause an obstruction. Dispose of leftover carcasses in the outside bin.

Pot plants

There are a few traditional Christmas gift plants that are dangerous for cats. If you are given one of these, either keep them in a cat-proof room or regift them to a pet free home.

Amaryllís, daffodíls, hyacínths, írís, místletoe and ALL LILIES are very poisonous to cats. If you thínk your cat has chewed on any of these, take him to the vet IMMEDIATELY. Poínsettías are less dangerous but some cats are sensitive to them and can have upset stomachs and vomit íf they eat them.

'You will be dry, you will be warm, you'll have enough to eat,' 'and rest assured that when you sleep your dreams will all be sweet.' She said 'There is a family that's waiting patiently and pretty soon we'll find them just you wait and see.'

I waited very patiently the days they came and went Today's the day I thought, my family will be sent. Then just when I began to think it wasn't meant to be, There were people standing there, just gazing down at me.

I knew them in a heartbeat, I could tell they felt it too. They said 'We have been waiting for a special cat like you.' Now every night I say a prayer to all the gods that be. 'Thank you for the life I live and all they've given me.'

'But most of all protect the cats who are living on the street, And send a rescue person to lift them off their feet.'

We're a busy branch juggling the rising costs of looking after the cats in our care – veterinary bills, food, litter and other equipment – with our efforts to help the cat population locally. We do this by offering financial support with neutering to those who need it and by neutering cats in feral colonies.

While we are all volunteers and put a huge amount of our own time into caring for and rehoming unwanted or abandoned cats, running our branch is expensive and we have to raise all of the funds we need ourselves. To give you an idea, the total cost of caring for our cats in 2018, including our neutering work, was around £16,000 and this excludes our running costs. With a diminishing band of volunteers, we are unable to run as many fundraising events as we used to so we are increasingly looking for other ways to raise funds.

One simple way you can help us is to leave us a gift in your will. It is a wonderful way to ensure that you continue to help cats after your death and leave a legacy to be proud of.

Man and two cats rescued by firefighters!

A man and two cats had to be rescued by firefighters after getting stuck in a tree together.

At around 11am, firefighters were called to Arnold Pitcher Close in North Walsham to reports of a man stuck in a tree. A fire crew from North Walsham attended the scene, where they discovered the man stranded in the tree alongside two cats.

It is believed the cats had got stranded in the tree originally, with the man also becoming stuck on trying to retrieve the ill-fated felines from their predicament.

Firefighters then helped the trapped trio down, leaving the scene at around 11.20am.

Cats in History



Also known as Oscar or Oskar, Unsinkable Sam lived during the World War II era and supposedly survived three separate shipwrecks, one in the German Kriegsmarine and two in the British Royal Navy. On all three occasions, Sam was found clinging to a floating plank. Veering from astounding to unbelievable, Sam's story is one of the numerous enduring tales of survival from that tragic period of history.

Born on board *HMS Reliance* in the year 1799, **Trim** almost didn't make it. The tiny black & white kitten fell overboard but saved himself by swimming back to the ship and climbing up a rope. Impressed, Captain Matthew Flinders adopted Trim. Flinders and Trim together circumnavigated Australia. When Flinders was imprisoned on charges of espionage in Mauritius, Trim stayed with him. Statues and plaques in both Australia and England commemorate Flinders and Trim's adventurous life together.
