SPRING NEWSLETTER 2021 **THIRD TIME LOCKY!**

HERE we go again... another newsletter to mark the end of another Covid lockdown.

This the third time so let's hope it's definitely the last!

Like the earlier shutdowns, our shop had to close but fortunately we were able to still take in and home cats.

This was also the case in the second lockdown last November, with the worst of the three being the first from March 2020 when all our cat activities had to stop.

Our shop reopened last summer and we started taking in cats again.

Homing has been good since then and in 2020, we helped 92 cats and kittens to new lives - an incredible achievement considering everything that happened.

It's also a great total because we only have a small number of fosterers. Fortunately turnaround was quick with high demand from potential new owners.

The pandemic had a major impact on the way all Cats Protection branches work as rules changed to limit personal interaction and keep the public and helpers safe.

We have been using "hands-free homing" which means people do not visit cats in their foster homes but meet them on FaceTime or see a video. Adoption fees are also paid online to stop money or cheques being handled.

These measures have worked well.

saving volunteers time and effort, so may continue in the future.

Many thanks for your support and we hope the remainder of 2021 will be more settled for all of us as the branch works hard to help as many local cats as possible.

YOUNG mum Wolfie came into our care when her three beautiful grey kittens were less than a day old.

Her owner had just had a baby herself and the situation was not working so she decided it would be better to give up her pet.

It was all very unsettling for Wolfie, aged two. She was very nervous and extremely protective of her brood so was too hostile to let our fosterer near them.

For her first ten days with us, we couldn't even think about socialising the little ones which could have caused problems in the future.

It's vital that kittens are handled and get used to humans in their first few months or they will grow up feral and lose out on the chance of living in a normal home.

But with lots of patience and TLC from her fosterer, Wolfie has thankfully learned to trust people.

Now she's happy to show off her litter of two boys and their sister.

We have a waiting list of potential owners so all the kittens have perfect homes to go to once they are old enough.

Then Wolfie will be neutered and have the chance of a fresh start when she is put up for adoption after all her hard work as a mum.

Twinkle was a jet black cat, just like his mum, while Ronnie was a tabby. When they were a few weeks older, the kits

were ready for homing and went on our website.

Diane wrote: "The boys have plenty of energy so they ideally need someone at home during the day who has the time to play with them. They were a little reserved for a couple of days when they first came into care but they soon found their feet and made themselves at home."

Lots of offers came in within hours so Ronnie and Twinkle were soon heading to a new home in Eltham where they were going to receive lots of attention and love. Meanwhile Pepsi was also looking for a fresh start after being listed online as "a lovely. very gentle girl who has been a brilliant mum. She has been spayed, chipped and vaccinated so she can start to enjoy being a kitten cat herself."

We were aiming for a quiet home without very young children to suit Pepsi and, like her boys, the right person came along within a day. It was a busy time for Diane but we were happy to see the whole family settled into their new happy lives.

Young Misty was a very sweet-natured girl who came into us after her owner died. The 18-month-old loved human contact but was a little nervous around other cats so needed to be homed as an only cat. With her lovely eyes and nice character, Misty drew a lot of inquiries when we listed her on our website.

But many were out of the SE London and North Kent area so we had to say No. After a short spell online, the right offer came in and Misty left us for a fresh start with a new owner.

TORTIE girl May lived with her disabled owner in a tiny flat and was well loved. But as he became very ill, it was his carers who fed May, even allowing her to eat whatever human food her owner didn't eat. Needless to say May, aged seven, put on a lot of weight! Sadly her owner passed away and May came into our care, going on a strict diet while we looked for a new home. Her ideal home would be without young children with someone who is at home most of the day. A bonus would be a house with stairs to boost her fitness regime!



READY EDDIE GO!



THIS sweet tabby boy had been a stray for some time but thankfully was being given food and shelter by a lovely lady.

Unfortunately she could not adopt him and asked for help, so Eddie came into us.

He enjoyed the comforts of being in the warm in a nice soft bed but blood tests revealed that he was FIV positive. This means he has feline immunodeficiency virus, which is contagious for other cats and commonly caught from bites.

So he had to be an only cat in an indoor home to stop him spreading the illness, which cannot transfer to humans.

He had a lot to offer and our website listing said: "He is such a good-natured boy. Eddie will make a lovely family member, and will settle in quickly. He is a healthy boy and has been given a clean bill of health from the vet. FIV cats can live a normal healthy life but need to be kept away from other cats."

Any concern we had that Eddie would struggle to be adopted disappeared as he was offered a home within a day!

Elysia and her partner were looking for an indoor cat as they live in a flat in Erith. Eddie fitted the bill perfectly and was soon on his way to his new home which does have a balcony so he can watch the world go by and still enjoy being outside.

HER cat Blossom has been a great comfort to our member Wendy since being adopted in 2015.

This was especially true after the death of Wendy's husband three years ago and in the aftermath of a serious fire at her home last May.

Wendy and her beloved pet had to move out for repairs, which took months longer than usual because of the lockdowns.

She said: "Poor Blossom had to adapt to becoming a house cat rather than roaming around our garden.

"She has done that quite well and I don't know what I would have done without her company in the temporary flat we have found ourselves in. She is hoping for a return to her roaming days soon!"

They were due to finally return home to Sidcup in March, with Wendy saying: "Yippee and many mews from puss cat."

She initially contacted us with an article she had penned about Blossom telling how the tortie started out as Pumpkin and had an adventure on her first trip away with her new owners in their camper van.

Wendy wrote: "My adopted pussycat started her path to our household when she was brought into Eltham CP with her two babes in 2015. My dear late husband and I were actually looking for yet another black-and-white female moggy (our fourth) but when we saw this friendly tortoiseshell, we gave her a quick stroke and that was it.

"We renamed her from Pumpkin to Blossom, but a shy, retiring, delicate kitty she was not. Being motorhome campers, we took her away in the camper that first weekend and she travelled like a veteran. However, not long after arriving at our weekend site, she wriggled her way out of her harness and lead and escaped over the field.

"We found where she'd holed up but Blossie was having far too much fun to come home.

"She must have preferred the younger generation because a fellow camper's young daughter finally enticed her into their motorhome with ham slices. Or perhaps she preferred their model of camper!

"By this time, the whole site knew of her so she certainly left her mark. We were just astounded that

she recognised which vehicle to return to as there were many white boxes on wheels near us.

"Since then she has become a perfect companion. She enjoys travelling distances by car or camper. She loves the garden but is always in calling distance and likes to be in sight of the house.

"Blossom chases the pigeons and tracks the foxes but is happy to be in early of a night when she reposes on a settee back with a front leg casually hanging over the side.

"She guards my bedroom door of a night and often beats me to bed. I think secretly she would like our roles to be reversed as she often has to be shooshed off the pillow. That is definitely a no-no.

"Like all puss cats, Blossom has her moments. Sometimes refusing to eat her normal food because she fancies a change. Always looking for the chance to try something new meal-wise, especially if it means begging morsels from my plate. In other words, she is a normal moggy.

"She really has been and continues to be a great comfort and pal. Long live puss cats and mine in particular."

left a basket and food with the kind lady as he got spooked. Hopefully he will return there as they have seen him all week."

Thankfully Chewi stayed put and was soon in a carrier and on his way home, eight days after going missing, none the worse for his adventure. A very relieved Domonic posted an update: "Now found, thanks for all the shares and help finding him"

Chewi had been microchipped so he could always have been traced back to his owner.

Getting this done is quick and easy, so if your cat is not chipped, please see your vet.
