## SUMMER NEWSLETTER 2020

#### Purrleased to be back!

#### THERE has been no escape for any of us from the coronavirus outbreak.

Like other charities, we had to close our shop and put our good work on hold when the lockdown was imposed in late March.

We had two cats in our care at that time which stayed with Diane until restrictions were eased.

As normal life stopped, we put a request on Facebook asking for owners who have adopted from us to share a photo and details of their cats.

Our followers didn't let us down! We were delighted when dozens posted and enjoyed reading about our former foster cats now happy in their new homes. Some stories were very recent while others told of cats helped by the branch more than a decade ago.

They included gorgeous Gertie, *right*, who was rescued as a very young kitten along with her mum Gracie and three siblings. They were found sheltering in a hole under a wall on a building site in 2015. The whole brood was looked after by one of our members Sarah, who went on to adopt Gertie and Gracie.

We have featured as many updates as possible in this newsletter. Looking back at so many cats enjoying new lives brings home the importance of our work.

We have also been heartened through the lockdown by donations of money. These include monthly direct debits, members who have renewed while adding a gift to their subscriptions and one-off payments.

Each and every contribution is appreciated as we still have bills to pay.

We are also grateful to past legacies from supporters who have remembered us in their wills, helping us to see out the lockdown.

Sadly our member Bunny (Maureen) King passed away recently and her family kindly nominated us to receive donations in her memory.

Many thanks to her daughter Sue, also a branch member, for arranging the collection and to friends and relatives who donated more than £300.

We have had positive news on welcoming customers back into our shop, with **July 27** being set as our date to reopen.

Volunteer manager Jacqui has been busy with measures to keep shoppers and volunteers safe. They include tape on the floor for distancing and a one-way



system, a perspex screen at the till and keeping donated items for 72 hours before pricing up and selling. Space is limited at the shop so, once we are open, please check on **020 8859 6009** before bringing in donations.

Meanwhile the national charity is moving to enable branches to help cats while keeping volunteers and the public safe. The first stage was preparing for "handsfree homing" which means placing cats with adopters without any close interaction. Initially potential owners could not visit a cat but saw them in photos or videos.

The progress to hands-free homing has entailed volunteers completing six training courses. That hard work enabled Diane to home the two female cats in our care at the start of lockdown. The next step is getting permission to take in needy cats.

We have also been contacted by some potential new volunteers although they are having to wait as recruitment has been put on hold.

But we will be back as soon as we can helping cats and kittens who need us, stronger and better than ever!

It is run by volunteer Sam, who checks for messages daily. Sometimes there are no updates needing action; at other times events unfold quickly over a few hours when a cat needs help.

Jack was one missing pet who was rescued thanks to Sam's prompt actions.

Recalling his rescue, Sam says: "Glancing at my phone, I saw I had several notifications to check while I had my morning cup of tea. The first was on our branch's Facebook Lost and Found page. My heart sank as I read Nicole's messages saying her beautiful white cat Jack was missing from home.

"He is neutered and microchipped, so I was hoping someone might find him and there would be a way to reunite him.

"A couple of hours later, Jack was still on my mind. I was thinking about how much harder it must be to look for a missing pet while we are in lockdown. I kept my own cat a little closer to me that morning. "That's when I looked at some incoming notifications on the WhatsApp group for the Covid 19 Mutual Aid group for my estate. I have been responding to calls for help for errands on that group.

"I clicked on one message and it was a photo of Jack in a tree! "The alert was from a kind lady called Ruta and her daughter Laura, a pupil at a local primary school. On that particular day they had walked through Oxleas Wood instead of their usual

route. That's when they spotted Jack miaowing 20ft up a tree. They realised he was probably stuck and set about getting his picture out via social media. "As soon as I saw it, I knew it was Jack and was able to contact Nicole immediately. "I was able to put Ruta and Nicole in touch, and before long Nicole was there.

"But how was she going to get him down? Luck was on Jack's side again as Nicole knew someone who might be able to help; a family friend with a ladder got there in time to rescue Jack. Nicole took him home to rest, safe and sound after his adventure. We are all grateful for the string of coincidences which led to Jack's safe return, and wish him and his family a long spell of peace and quiet following his adventures! "Many thanks also to Ruta and Laura for their part in his rescue."

Jacqui added: "She has left a huge hole in our home and will be sadly missed, but just living had become a struggle for her... "Goodbye Luna xxxx."

Ann said: "RIP Luna. Me and my son used to come in just to see her and give money for treats even if we didn't buy anything. She was so loved."



At least she got to see kindness and she's crossed the rainbow bridge knowing she was loved and with a full belly." Deborah M said: "When our pets pass away they always leave a big hole in our lives, but she will have known a happy, loving life in her later years, thanks to you."

Luna had been a stray in Woolwich. Her microchip had been put in 20 years ago, so she must once have had an owner who cared, but we had no luck tracing anyone. We think her owner had



died and there was no one to look after poor Luna.

She had been fed outside by a kind man for about two years, but when he began to suffer from dementia his daughter asked for our help. So Luna went to live with Jacqui, who brought her into the shop each day. She had a special snoozing spot set up in our shop window by volunteers with a step to help her get in as arthritis had started to affect her. When not sleeping, Luna liked to watch the world go by on Well Hall Road and enjoy strokes from customers and helpers.

Being in the warm with regular meals during those months had really helped Luna.

Jacqui said: "She had been in a lot of leg pain and her fur had been shaved because she was in such a state.

"But she began to walk much better and she trotted into the back room for her food and then back out to the front of the shop to keep an eye on proceedings. She was quite happy and she just loved to sleep and eat."

17th birthday this summer after being adopted by Emma in 2006.


Then there is mum PEPSI who lives with




## PERFECT POPPETS






## LILY IS IN THE PINK
