During this time, I've formed a great friendship with Mel, who has been a great teacher, leader and tower of support.




SPECIAL APPEAL FOR LOLA



The major political parties put compulsory microchipping of cats in their 2019 election manifestos. But no progress has been made and the issue risks falling off the political agenda.

SAFELY REHOMING OUR CATS DURING COVID 19

If you had told us at the beginning of the year that we would be homing cats that the adopter had not met, we wouldn't have believed it! However Hands-Free Homing has proved an incredible success in helping us to keep homing cats during the pandemic.

How does Hands-Free Homing work?

Step 1 - view the cats online

Take a look at the available cats on our <u>Adopt-a-Cat</u> page of our website

Step 2 – register your interest

Simply complete the online form, settle back and wait to hear from our team in a few days.

Step 3 – chat to our team

A member of our team will get in touch to have a chat. We'll ask you a bit about your home environment and also tell you as much as we can about the cat you're interested in. This ensures the best possible match for you. Sometimes after the initial chat we may discover the cat isn't best suited and we may suggest another cat that may suit you better.

Step 4 – complete the adoption forms

We can email or post these over to you, so you can complete them at home, and send them to us before collecting your kittie.

Step 5 – collect your lovely new buddy

We can arrange a time for you to come to our carpark to collect the cat. If you don't have transport, we may be able to bring the cat direct to your home.

Step 6 – ensuring you and your cat are happy

We offer after-homing support and will check in with you to see how your new family member is settling in. You are still welcome to contact us at any time with any questions or concerns. We want to ensure that you and your cat are both happy, and will always take the cat back if it doesn't work out.



It's great for the cats too!

Cats who may have been previously overlooked are now being noticed on the website as they are not being upstaged by the cat in the pen next door grabbing all the attention. Because the new owners have not met the cat before, it seems that they're also investing more time getting to know their new buddy and allowing her to settle.

Having more communication directly with the new owner before adoption, gives the adopter more time to listen to advice, read our guidelines and be more prepared for their new feline family member.

It may seem odd for people to adopt a cat they haven't been able to meet in person, but the return rate of cats across Cats Protection during the Hands-Free Homing process has actually been below the reported return rates of cats over past years across the charity. Amazing!

Since the start of the lockdown, we've rehomed over 100 cats from our Centre. So as you can see, we've kept our focus on the kitties; and we've found new, innovative, safe and trusted ways to support our cats to ensure they get the best possible chance in life with their new families.

Her Mum has a business in Cowes and all the staff needed masks – this is how the idea came about for making washable reusable masks and selling them from the front garden in aid of IOW Cats Protection. The masks were a much bigger hit than she had first expected and Beth raised over £400.

A PLEA FOR VOLUNTEER CAT FOSTERERS

At our Centre in Ryde, we always have many cats needing a little extra help until they find their forever families. These may include kittens that need socialising, or cats that are very shy and need help to regain trust in humans; others may be recovering from illness or an operation and simply need a quiet warm place to recuperate.

Fostering is a volunteer role that is extremely important to us. It involves taking a Cats Protection cat into your home and caring for her (anything from a week to a few months) until she is ready to be adopted. All you need is a spare room, a bit of time and lots of love to give. We take care of all the rest, including all the costs.


