SHY FOXY FINDS A HOME

Remember our Foxy appeal from our last issue? This very shy cat had been abandoned so many times in the past. And, despite all our appeals, nobody wanted to adopt her. So, we were absolutely thrilled when a very special family just fell in love with her.



Here's her new mum to tell the tale

"As soon as we saw Foxy on the website, we just knew she was the one for us.

When we brought Sooty (her new name) home, she was a very scared little cat. For nearly eight weeks, she would not leave her 'safe' room. She was also very defensive and would tell us to back off with a swipe of her paw. She never had her claws out – it was only a warning. She could not have bitten us either because all her rotting teeth had to be removed by Cats Protection because they had been causing her so much pain.

We wondered what sort of life she must have had for her to be so terrified. We knew she had been abandoned by numerous owners before. I am sure she wondered how long she would be with us! I wish I could tell her she needn't worry. When I adopt a cat, it is for her entire life – there was no way we would ever abandon this sweet little girl. We really would be her forever home.



As you can imagine, we were so happy when one day she tentatively ventured into the living room to join us. Sooty had finally turned the corner.

Three months later...

Sooty has blossomed. She spends so much time on my lap now – purring all the time and she talks constantly. The transformation of Sooty, from when we first adopted her to now, is truly astonishing. I feel the miraculous change in Sooty is due to giving her the time she needed to adjust to yet another home.

Each day she gets more and more loving. We have earned her trust, and we have been rewarded with her love and affection. This little nervous cat only wanted a quiet and peaceful home and wanted someone to love her to bits. I feel she has now found this, and we will always be there for her".

Shy cats like Sooty often get overlooked at the Centre, sometimes waiting for many months to find a home. If you're looking to adopt, please do think about giving one of these shy cats a second chance in life.

COULD TOBI BE CATS PROTECTION'S CAT OF THE YEAR?

A cat adopted in 2005 from our IOW Centre, has been named as a finalist in Cats Protection's National Cat Awards.

Tobi beat hundreds of other entries to



take his place as one of three contenders in the Outstanding Rescue Cat category, celebrating cats adopted from rehoming charities. The results will be announced later this year.

The 15-year-old puss was selected as a finalist in recognition of how he helped Misha (now 26

years old), cope with a traumatic childhood. Having suffered mental health issues, Misha attempted to take her own life before she was taken into foster care at 15 years old.

Having insisted on keeping her beloved pet with her in foster care, Misha had a constant source of companionship and comfort, helping to heal her emotional scars. Sixteen years later, the pair are still together living in a home of their own.

Here's what Misha told us...

"Tobi has been there for me through thick and thin; he has seen me at my lowest and stuck with me. He's got a huge personality so he is constantly making me laugh. When things were very bad when I was a teenager, he would always be there for me to cuddle when I was crying. Nowadays, whenever I'm upset, I guarantee he'll be by my side in five seconds.

Tobi has been my rock, best friend and soul mate, and I know for sure I would never have made it this far without him. Tobi is now nearly 16 and has been diagnosed with kidney disease, so it's my turn to be strong for him, and it breaks my heart.

Every Christmas and birthday is a blessing and I am grateful every day for the love, friendship and security he has given me for most of my life."

Did you know...

- 'Tortoiseshell' is not a breed of cat. Tortie cats are so named because their fur pattern has a similar look to the shell of the larger exotic tortoises and turtles.
- They usually have very distinctive personalities (often known as Tortitude). They can be very wilful and are often known as the divas of the cat world.
- Torties have a huge fan club around the world. Such is their appeal that most Tortie owners wouldn't dream of having any other cat. As one Tortie owner told us:

"Once you 'go Tortie' there's no going back. Life is just plain boring without one!"



SPECIAL APPEAL

PLEASE HELP US FIND MIFFY A HOME

Miffy is a dear little Tortoiseshell cat. She is five years old and has been in our care for over three months. Miffy came to us all the way from Wales where her owner had been evicted and Miffy was left homeless. Understandably, she was very stressed and had lost a lot of fur because of this. Fate then hit her hard and she got very ill with cat flu. Thankfully she's a fighter and pulled through but she had suffered so much, we thought she would be best placed in foster care for some love and affection in a quiet home.

Her coat has started to improve and we are confident that with time and lots of TLC, it will soon be back to all its natural gorgeous colours of amber, cinnamon and chocolate. She's also gaining in confidence.

Here's what her foster mum told us

"Miffy is an affectionate cat who likes company but enjoys her own time as well. Being a curious Tortie, she likes to poke her nose into everything and, when she finds something that can be a toy, she will appropriate it until it no longer amuses her.

She explores high places and soft duvets, settling down wherever she feels comfortable for a quick or extended nap. Her purr is sweet and low but never far away and Miffy also has an occasional enquiring voice which she uses to establish where others are.





She loves running up and down stairs, preferably batting a toy but sometimes just for the fun of it. I think she would be happiest with an older family who will be able to give her a secure and happy home with plenty of attention. She is an adorable cat".

Did you know...

- All Torties are ladies. (Torties have a unique genetic code so only about one in 3000 is a male).
- In folklore, Torties were said to bring good luck. For this reason, they're sometimes called 'Money Cats' in the USA. And in Japan, they're believed to ward off evil spirits. In fact, Japanese sailors sometimes kept these cats on their boats to keep themselves safe from harm while on the water.
- Even today, in many places, it is still regarded as good luck if a stray Tortie settles in your home.

We certainly believe that any home with a Tortie is a lucky one!

COOL FOR CATS?

Is your cat a sun-loving fluffball? Most kitties love the sun, but just as for us, sunburn, skin cancer, dehydration and heatstroke are real threats and can be fatal. Here's a few tips to keeping your cats safe during summer.

Keeping your cat cool

- Dab a small towel soaked in cold water over your cat's fur, or just stroke your cat with wet hands, to bring some relief.
- Use a cooling mat. There are a wide range for pets available to buy, but placing freezer blocks or pads, or even a pack of frozen vegetables, well wrapped in a blanket will have a similar effect.
- If possible, keep your cat indoors from 10am-3pm when the sun is at its strongest and most dangerous.

Heatstroke can be serious. Signs include collapse, panting and dribbling. If you suspect your cat is suffering, move him to a cool place, wet his coat with cool water (not freezing) and contact a vet immediately.



Sunburn and skin cancer

Sunburn and skin cancer are possible in all cats. However palecoloured cats, or cats that have unpigmented white noses or ears, are at particular risk.

Use a sunscreen to protect these sensitive areas. Focus on your cat's nose, tips of the ears, belly and groin areas as well as anywhere that has thin to no fur. Use a sunscreen designed specifically for pets. Do not use human sunscreens as many contain products that can be toxic to animals if ingested. (And we all know how much cats like to groom themselves!)



Watch out for those cats that love to snooze inside by their favourite sunny window – he will still be absorbing UV light. You can get UV blocking film to prevent the rays from coming through your windows.



Dehydration

Pinch a bit of skin at the top of your cat's neck - if the skin doesn't fall back immediately, your cat is likely to be dehydrated. Sticky gums (rather than simply wet gums) are another sign.

The following tips will help to encourage your cat to drink more and stay hydrated during the summer months:-

- Cats prefer to drink away from where they eat, so place your cat's water bowl in a separate location.
- Put water bowls in different places around the house so cats always find somewhere to drink.
- Try different sized bowls. Many cats prefer wide-rimmed bowls because they don't like their whiskers touching the sides. However some prefer drinking from a glass of water, so provide some 'cat-only' glasses but make sure they can't easily be knocked over.
- Avoid plastic bowls, especially in the heat. These can taint the taste of the water. Use glass or ceramic instead.
- Consider adding a tasty flavour to the water such as low-salt tuna ice cubes.
- Many cats prefer running water, so try offering a cat fountain.
- If you feed your cat tinned food, small amounts of water can be mixed into the food, which will increase fluid intake.
- Some cats hate the taste of chlorine in tap water, so try offering bottled water instead.

Dehydration is serious, so do contact your vet if you suspect dehydration.
