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A STICKY START!

Kay gets 'glued-up' on how to treat an adhesive cat!

n mid-November, one call amongst the many to the Branch helpline to request assistance with neutering, was from the 'Station Master' of an industrial estate near the North Circular Road in Edmonton. A mother cat and kittens were living in

a disused building on the industrial estate. The mother seemed tame but the kittens had not been handled, so were very timid.

On visiting the site, I found three kittens; two of the three kittens were trapped fairly quickly taken to the vets to be neutered and taken into care, but the mother and her third kitten were most elusive. After several attempts, I was successful in trapping the kitten only to find that it was smothered in an extremely sticky substance. I took it immediately Medivet who investigated substance to find that it was an industrial adhesive. Under anaesthetic, the kitten (now called Sticky) had the majority his



coat shaved. His body and what fur remained needed to be bathed regularly in vegetable oil and 'Swarfega' to remove the glue. He remained at the vets for five days for this treatment to be carried out. The picture shows him back at home with very little fur.

Amazingly, within a week, this regular handling and bathing had turned Sticky

The Station Master had asked to adopt the kitten, if it could be saved. And so it was that, just seven days after being covered in glue with a slim chance of survival, this little kitten has gone from a very sticky start to a happy ending. This picture shows *Sticky* recovering and gradually re-growing his fur.

By the way, his two siblings are doing fine and should be adopted soon. Sadly, I was unable to catch the mother, so she is free to breed again; let's hope that any further kittens don't suffer the same start in life as poor little *Sticky*.

t is never good to start with an apology, so here I go breaking the rules! This Autumn edition of the newsletter should have been edited and distributed in November. Pressure of work (volunteering) prevented me from achieving this aim for which I apologise. So, welcome to the New Year 2015 edition!

As 2014 ends and 2015 begins, it is time to reflect on what we achieved last year and what we should strive to achieve this year. Briefly, in 2014 our loyal band of volunteers continued to deal with the huge numbers of cats needing care and attention; we continue to receive up to 20 reguests to take cats into care each week. We homed around 130 cats and kittens, somewhat lower than 2013, but there were understandable reasons for the reduction. We had a number of pens inactive for some weeks whilst they were repaired or replaced; the number of pens available to us has reduced and the general situation common to many branches is of difficulty in finding adopters for our cats in care.

ur sponsorship scheme has been running for over 21 years and helps to support the long-term care of our cats that are difficult to re-home.

As well as the many cats that are available for adoption, we also have some in our care who cannot, for various reasons, be adopted into new homes and must remain in foster care for the rest of their lives. Some are simply too old to adjust to another home; others have health problems. Sadly we also have cruelty cases where the cat is too traumatised and could not cope with a new home. BUT we do need money to keep these cats safe and well in our care. We need to provide for their food and keep; many need regular medication and other veterinary care and this all costs money! To pay for this, we operate **The** Sponsorship Scheme.

When *Tabitha*'s owner died, she came into care but was found to have a pronounced heart murmur and needing considerable dental work. This was seen to by one of our vets and now *Tabitha* lives with Sarah Green and her family. The photo is delightful with the cat and the little girl, Reighan, really 'connecting'.

This is what Sarah said "Our daughter, Reighan, is now 18 months old and she has such a beautiful bond with *Tabitha*, (as you can see from the picture). Whenever our daughter is upset *Tabitha* rushes to her in an attempt to soothe her and stop her crying. She nuzzles her and tries to lick her tears away whilst meowing softly to let her know she's there, it's so beautiful! I don't know many animals, let alone cats, which cherish an 18 month old. *Tabitha* is a strong and important part of our family and each and every one of us loves her dearly."

The bond between *Tabitha* and Reighan is obvious from this beautiful photograph. Feline Dental Hygiene!

Scamp is 5 years old and, on a recent visit to the vets, they found that he was developing mild gingivitis in his gums. Despite using a daily toothpaste, which I would put on his paw, this wasn't having a great effect on his gums, so the vet suggested that I buy a baby toothbrush and try brushing his teeth!

Now, although *Scamp* is a very accommodating, large cat, I did wonder how he would react to this. As he has a once-weekly grooming session (combing, ear cleaning, weighing and generally checking him all over), I decided to introduce the tooth brushing into this regime. I needn't have worried. *Scamp* was as accommodating as ever, and took to it immediately.

After just a few months, his gums are not looking so inflamed. By continuing to brush his teeth, this should reduce the need for dental treatment (under anaesthetic).

I would recommend that anyone who gets a new cat should start getting their cat used to having his mouth played with (as I did with *Scamp*) from an early age. This has allowed me to not only brush his teeth, but also to administer all sorts of medicines as and when necessary. *Yvonne Rapley, Welfare Officer*

Bumble Bee and Pepa

Some years ago, Marian Feldman took me over to Nazeing, to a bungalow overrun with black and white cats! Mrs Prentice was moving home and could not take her very feral cats with her. Marian and I trapped them over a few weeks and at last had them all safely caught. They came to live with us at Brides Farm in Hertford Heath. They were always feral and kept their distance even at feeding time.

When we knew that we were moving to Wales in the summer of 2013, we set about trapping them and, as each one was caught, they were put into a heated shed in very large cages. We placed two or three cages together to make a long run for them. The last one to be caught, being the most nervous, was called *Bumble Bee*. We bought a long rabbit hutch and she began feeding in there. At last we had her in! She was so frightened at being in captivity, that I

brought her into the house; there, still in her long rabbit hutch, she got used to us and the nine dogs!

When we moved to Wales, she came to live inside the house with us, (and our house cats). She gradually became less nervous and then an amazing change came over her; she became attached to me, following me round the house and sitting on my lap in the evenings.

She was fed little treats and titbits next to me on the sofa. This, I realised later, must have been the reason why one of our dogs became over-jealous and did what she did. We came home one night to find our beloved *Bumble Bee* lying dead on the floor.

I cannot describe how upset I was; it had taken so many years to build her confidence and trust and I felt totally guilty. We have 9 dogs and 20 cats and not once has anything like this ever happened. My dogs don't even chase cats.

One month ago, we were in Spain on holiday and I noticed a young cat feeding at the back of a restaurant. The owner told us that this little cat was the last one left as all the other kittens and mother cat had been run over by cars on the dangerous crossing to the restaurant.

During our week, I began feeding her. At the end of the week I knew I had to bring her home. She went into quarantine for 21 days and was driven to our Welsh home by *EasyPet*. When she arrived, I took her upstairs to settle in. That was one week ago.

Since she has arrived I have realised that she is identical in every way to *Bumble Bee*. Every hair on her body is the same. Her markings are the same. Her personality is the same. In every way she is *Bumble Bee*. But the real shock came when, yesterday, I pulled out our old Christmas tree and started putting it up. I suddenly remembered that, at exactly this time last year, *Bumble Bee* had died the week before I had started putting up the tree. So this new, identical cat called *Pepa*, arrived at our home in Wales in the same week as *Bumble Bee* died!

Don't worry; little *Pepa* will live in the safety of our upstairs and only come down when we are there; the Jack Russel who had committed the act now is kept well away. *Robbie Bartington*

Horticultural Half Hour

ell, as my Dad used to say, no birds, no bees, no flowers, no trees, no wonder, November! Well, this is actually not quite true. November is a wonderful month for autumn colour displays and, as the weather has been quite mild lately when the sun has been shining, I have seen the odd bee flying about. The birds are also still very active and a reminder to keep feeding them, especially as the weather turns even colder and wetter. I find when I'm away and not feeding the birds it takes a few days for them to come back, so they really do get into a routine and rely on food put out for them. Also remember to leave out a bowl of fresh water.

When the days are brilliant and sunny, it is a real treat to visit gardens where there are glorious autumn displays to enjoy, but it is also a time to take note of beautiful trees and shrubs that you like and see if you can incorporate them into your own garden. Even if it is just one or two autumn display plants, it can make a big difference to your own view from your kitchen window. Suggestions include the many small Japanese Acer palmatum varieties now widely available, which can also be grown in containers. Acers are best grown in dappled shade, in moist freedraining neutral to acid soil. They give wonderful seasonal displays in gold, red, and orange depending on the variety are invaluachosen, and some have striking coloured bark as well.

Callicarpa bodinieri var. giraldi 'Profusion' has unusual, but striking purple bead-like berries. The fruit are often the last to be takby the birds, and this lack of popularity means they are left for you to enjoy for a little longer, and



don't forget hollies. Ilex acquifolium is the native green Happy Gardening variety, but there are many cultivated forms available, in- Julia

cluding the variegatvariety 'Handsworth New Silver', which is a purple-stemmed holly with slender leaves edged with cream. Hollies are mainly dioecious. This means most forms have male flowers on one plant and females on another. Both are required for berries. In a small garden vou could plant 'J C van Tol', a selffertile holly with not too prickly green leaves that can berry on its own. Once established, hollies

ble for inclusion in homemade Christmas decorations.

don't be too tidy and leave some untidy areas for the wildlife, including some piles of logs etc. for overwintering bugs, frogs and toads. We all need somewhere warm and dry in the winter, and this includes the many creatures that share your garden.

Free Neutering

REE neutering is available through the Cat Care & Control Consortium 'C4' scheme - a joint initiative by major animal charities working in Greater London to tackle the problem of too many cats. C4 offers free neutering for cats within the M25 area whose owners receive certain state benefits, are on a low income or are students. The scheme also includes neutering of stray cats that are being fed temporarily by someone.

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
