'Supercat' Saves Sparkles

The Royal Veterinary College posted the following on its Facebook page on 4 March 2014:

"This is supercat Mikey Matley, who donated blood today at the Queen Mother Hospital for Animals for a very anaemic cat in intensive care called Sparkles Smith. Two-year-old Mikey has now successfully donated three times; he is blood type AB - the most rare blood type in cats. Mikey enjoyed a bowl of sardines this afternoon after his donation and is now relaxing at home with his proud owners."

Mikey's proud owner posted on the Lea Valley Facebook page:

"Mikey, adopted from the Lea Valley branch in June of 2011 as a



kitten, gave blood again recently to help save an anaemic cat. The scheme (based at the Royal Vet College in the Brookmans Park/ Potters Bar area) is trying to recruit new donors. There are a few criteria that cats need to meet (I think over 4kg, between 1 and 4 years old, never received a blood transfusion, in good overall health and a calm temperament - there may be others I've forgotten) but, if your cat ticks these boxes, it's a really worthwhile thing to do. think there is something especially great about rescued cats being able to help other cats in need through a scheme like this!"

REE neutering is available through the 'C4' scheme - a joint initiative by major animal charities working in Greater London to tackle the problem of too many cats.

Memories of an Accidental Fosterer

suppose my journey began when we decided near the end of 2010 that we wanted another cat both as a pet and a hunter as we do get a lot of creatures where we live and whilst my motto is 'live and let live', we sometimes have to be realistic!

We had an initial phone call from Lynette, the Adoption Officer and, when we mentioned that we liked to go over to Ibiza now and again, she suggested fostering as an option. At the home visit, we all agreed that we would give it a try. First cat, Lulu, arrived and was duly settled in a spare bedroom. Tony, the husband, decided to give it a cuddle as it was frightened. I was out and when I returned it was a hissing, spitting, wild thing (Lulu - not Tony!). First lesson learned - let the cat come to you in its own time. Lulu was duly homed and had changed into a nice cat. Others followed, all teaching us something about cats along the way.

I also learnt that even an older cat, a portly old lady called Smudge who was sixteen, could be loved and homed. There is always one that touches you and our one was Gracie, a little white cat who was such a character and had me wrapped around her paw from day one. Sadly, after a later check-up at the vet, it was discovered that she had cancer and, although she put up a valiant fight, she lost her battle with the disease. Also, whilst looking after Gracie, we took on a cat who was difficult - and she still is, but is still very well loved! Husky is on sponsorship but still feels like ours.

Along the way we adopted one of our foster cats who came back from her new home, after a car accident changed her personality and left her with a stumpy tail. Zippy suits us as a lovely pet and works hard getting rid of any

creatures that invade our space!

After a few months'

break from fostering after losing Gracie, Lynette asked us last October if we could take in an emergency case for a couple of weeks, looking after a tiny, underweight kitten. Dotty turned out to be nearly blind and was transferred as agreed to another fosterer, Carole, who finally adopted her. Carole has since become a good friend.

As a result of this re-awakening of the fostering role, we now have a pen in our garden and have become outdoor fosterers since the beginning of January. We have had success so far with our homings and, at the present time, we have two beautiful white cats in our pen, the little one is deaf but another great character. Hopefully we already have a retired couple interested in giving them a good home together, especially as they are former fosterers themselves. It might have been temping to adopt these too (as we have a soft spot for white cats!) but then we think there is always another cat around the corner that may be unwanted or a needy stray.....and we want to be there to nurture and care for them, so that they are ready for their new, forever home.

Yvonne's Allergy Cure

s you will have read in the last newsletter, I found out should I have an acute reaction.

a few months ago that I had become allergic to cats! The cat I reacted to was a long-haired female who, thank-

Talk about a shock!

I developed extremely itchy lumps [hives] over the whole of my body. The itching was so intense that I was unable to sleep. After two days, and terrible bruising appearing all over my body, I took myself to the doctor. Not only was the itching sending me crazy, but my family and colleagues were beginning to suffer from my lack of concentration, and the inability to do anything other than scratch.

As this was the third time that this had happened, my G.P. decided to take some blood. I received a 'phone call a week later asking me to go back and see her. When she told me that the allergic reaction was due to cats, I was shocked, to say the least.

Her immediate advice was to 'get rid

of the cat', something that I was obviously unwilling to do. able to keep her much-loved cats. I explained that, not only did I have my own cat, but also I hope others will think seriously about keeping their cats if that I had been fostering cats for the previous six years. When she realised how important my cat was to me, and GP who will, hopefully, be as supportive as mine. all the many other cats that needed our [CP] help, and how reluctant I was to give up fostering, she decided to put me Yvonne Rapley

on long term medication. I now take one tablet a day of Fexofenadine as a preventative, and also carry steroids



fully, Lynette homed for me very quickly. My own cat is long-haired, but I seem to have built up immunity to him. I now try to avoid taking in long-haired cats myself.

I often receive 'phone calls on the helpline to say that someone has become allergic to cats. Obviously, if it is a child, no parent wants them to take long-term medication; however, I did receive a call from a lovely lady who was reacting badly to her two cats. When I explained what had happened to me, and how my doctor had eventually supported my wish to carry on having cats in my life, she took herself off to see her own G.P. The outcome is that she is now taking the same medication as me, the allergy has settled and, most importantly, she has been

Horticultural Half Hour

s I write the sun is out! Which is amazing given the last couple of months of wild, wet and windy weather. The best advice at the moment is really to keep out of the garden, especially if it is flooded or very wet and boggy. Lawns are very resilient and will almost certainly survive. Walking on the lawn when wet and soaked can do real harm if you compact the soil just as the air is trying to get back in. Leave well alone and see how it recovers (a little like droughts in summer - remember those! Lawns will usually green up again after weeks of being straw brown and dry.) If after a few weeks your lawn is still look-

ing sad and yellow with the damp, leave it until the warmer from the old leaves. The flower stems look a bit bare and weather and it should start to improve and eventually grow vulnerable with no leaves at their base, but it is easier to again. Gardening Dangers for Cats

It will soon be time to guard against your cats coming into contact with lilies and slug pellets; both could cause problems for your cats!

Lilies

- Cats are very sensitive to plants of the Lilium species, including Easter, Stargazer, Tiger and Asiatic lilies.
- All parts of a lily are toxic, even the flowers and pollen (which can be groomed off its coat if the cat brushes past the flowers). Less than one leaf ingested by a cat can cause kidney failure.
- Signs to look for are prolonged vomiting, not eating and depression.
- Urgent veterinary treatment is required.
- CHECK FLOWER LABELS FOR WARNINGS OF TOXICITY TO ANIMALS

Some slug baits

- Metaldehyde or methiocarb are problem ingredients in some slug baits and any amount can be toxic for a cat.
- Cats may become unsteady on their legs, salivate and twitch and can suffer convulsions.
- Signs of poisoning develop quickly so urgent treatment is needed.
- AVOID PRODUCTS CONTAINING METALDEHYDE or METHIOCARB IF YOU




