Spring is in the air and we are getting ready for another busy year with Cats Protection. It won't be long before we are hearing the pitter patter of tiny furry feet again. Kitten season used to be Spring and Summer but we seem to get kittens born at any time of year now. Last year we helped with the costs of neutering 235 cats and kittens but the number of kittens we take in each year never seems to reduce. Cats Protection continues to promote the neutering of domestic and feral cats and we can help out with the cost of neutering if the cat's owner is on benefits or has a low income.

Because we are part of a large charity, Sheila, our co-ordinator, has the onerous task of completing a lot of the paperwork that is required by Head Office. Although our branch is very small, this takes a fair amount of her time and she keeps the other volunteers updated with any new information/requirements that come from HO. She has compiled some statistics for last year, some of which are shown below, more can be found on our website.

Vet bills continue to be our biggest expense as Cats Protection have Minimum Veterinary Standards which means that all cats/kittens coming into our care need to be vet checked. Stray and feral cats are blood tested for Fiv/Felv and all cats are treated for fleas/worms, vaccinated against cat flu and neutered when old enough. Some cats will need additional veterinary treatment for injuries or health problems.

A little bit of Magic



One day in January I received a call from a member of the public who had found a black kitten sitting by the garden bonfire. When it saw her it hissed and ran down a rabbit hole. The lady said it was about 6 months old and frightened of people and in view of this I said that it was probably feral and all I could do would be to trap it and get it blood tested and neutered and return it to the area. However she rang back

the next day to say the kitten had appeared at the window miaowing to come in. She had let it in and he was friendly and hungry and smaller than she had initially thought. We got him to the vet where he was checked over and found to be fine and I went to pick him up.

Magic, as I called him, was a lovely boy, very affectionate and he settled into my house immediately, curled up in the radiator bed as though he had always been there. I couldn't understand why someone had abandoned him or if he was lost, why had no-one reported him missing. The lady who found him, put up posters in the area and we put his details on our website. A week later we got a call from a man who had seen the poster and he said he thought it was his kitten. His kitten, Jet, had escaped from the house after returning from the vet. His brother, Ash, was really missing him and he had been lost for over 2 weeks. What was amazing was that he was found over 20 miles from home. Both his owners regularly travelled to Thornhill, near where he turned up, so it seems likely he had got in one of their vehicles and then gone a few miles on foot to where he was found.

Magic wasn't microchipped so we asked the people to send a photo to identify him and they came to see him later in the day and initially the lady was unsure as he was bigger than she remembered but her partner knew it was definitely Jet. They couldn't believe they had got him back and after taking him home, rang me to say that he had hissed at Ash and chased him but were now sleeping together. A story with a happy ending but had he been microchipped we could have returned him to his owners straight away. His owners are planning to get him chipped when he is neutered.

Microchip Your Cat (why you should!)

Microchipping of animals has been carried out for some years but it is only in the last few years that our branch started microchipping all the cats in our care. 3 of our brave volunteers attended a microchipping course at Cats Protection Glasgow Adoption Centre. It is a permanent way of identifying your pet and if your cat gets lost or gets in a vehicle and ends up miles from home (as one of mine did, but that's a story for another day) then if it gets taken to a vet or picked up by an animal rescue organisation, it will be scanned for a chip and can be returned to the owner. It is a quick and straightforward procedure and involves the microchip being inserted under the skin between the shoulder blades with a special tool. The chip is about the size of a grain of rice and insertion of the chip should cause no more than minor discomfort to the cat.

We are occasionally able to reunite a stray cat with its owner but many of the cats we take in are not microchipped and have not been reported missing so we have to find new homes for them. We can easily update the info on the site and there is an option for the public to donate online.
