What's been going on at Stockport CP ...

Hello and welcome to our second newsletter.

We hope this newsletter finds you and your families, human and 4 legged ones, happy and above all healthy. What an incredibly stressful and strange year we have all had. This Covid pandemic has turned all our lives upside down and has certainly kept us all on our toes.

It has been a tough year for us (and all charities) as we haven't been able to put on our normal fundraising events and the opportunity to keep in touch. Roger has filled the gap with regular fundraising Zoom meetings that cheered us all up.

This year, despite Covid restrictions and long periods when we were not able to rehome, we have managed to find 21 cats their forever home plus we have provided discounted neutering vouchers for over 500 cats. We continue to provide help and support for cats and their feeders in the Stockport area.

The incoming emails and calls from people wanting to give cats up, or reporting strays, or found cats this year both in and outside of our catchment area has been overwhelming. We have helped them all best we can either with advice or hands on rescue, many of the cats we have helped recently have been long standing unwanted elderly strays.

We found Alfie a forever home after a dental at the grand old age of 18!

George (you might remember from Facebook) was an elderly unneutered and elusive stray we'd been trying to catch for ages, he was scratching a living near Bredbury tip. He had the most terrible teeth and mouth problems, but after treatment he is healthy and happy, and he now has his forever home.

Another elderly unneutered stray we helped was Bear who had been wandering around Offerton for years, he now has a lovely new home and owner.

We have been busy with our TNR work and one recent difficult and stressful job was a large feral community on Bredbury industrial estate. Over several weeks we trapped and neutered the adults and 3 kittens also came into our care from the estate. All had cat flu, one kitten ended up in Woodcroft vets as an emergency with fluid on his lungs. Without our intervention he would have died. All the kittens have been socialised and will be up for adoption soon.

Now a big thank you to all our volunteers, donators and supporters who have helped us in so many ways this year, thanks to Jackie and Chris for the website, Ian, Sian and Julia for Facebook, Instagram & Twitter.

A huge thank you to Kerry and Sonia who have helped in so many rescues this year and another big thank you to our homing team for all their hard work. Thank you to the fantastic Castlecroft Cattery for taking in our stray cats at short notice.

Clarence – all claws and cuddles ...

First meeting Clarence in the kennels was a scary experience - a huge tabby with teeth a sabretoothed tiger would have been proud of, he wasn't exactly friendly. He was a bit snarly in fact, but there was something about him which made us go back...and back. We took the plunge, signed on the dotted line and then wondered what on earth we'd let ourselves in for... A lap cat he wasn't...or so we thought.



His first evening in his new home was eventful hiding behind the microwave, a lot of hissing and spitting followed



by an escape attempt up the chimney - things could only get better, and yes they did. It took a while and we got through a lot of plasters, but once he realised he was warm, dry, fed and the master of all he surveyed, the fearsome tom turned quite soppy. He's FIV positive so the outdoors was never

an option, but he's more than happy curled up on the sofa, chasing a ball or a piece of string. Lockdown has been fun for him as well, with fulltime company (no you don't want to work, play with me instead!) and lunchtime treats. He's most definitely a lap cat now - a rather heavy one who snores a lot, but the claws have given way to cuddles and we couldn't be happier! We can't thank Mel from Cats Protection enough for all her help and advice - we've filled a cat-shaped gap in our lives and Clarence has found the laps he's always wanted!

Sully ...

We were looking for a new rescue cat, our previous beautiful rescue cat died in October 2019. She was a black cat and we decided not to have another black cat. However when we read Sully's story on the Cats Protection site we knew we had to meet him. He was another black cat.

Sully hasn't had a great start in life, a car accident, abandonment and illness. He had been diagnosed with FIV. All this had left him a very sad cat. Melanie, from Cats Protection, had done wonders for him whilst looking for a new home. He was clearly on the mend health wise but still very shy with strangers.

Melanie and I talked before we went to visit. She was incredibly honest about the FIV and about his timidness with people. So we were prepared to take things slowly. Melanie was great - she let us spend lots of time with Sully. He slowly started to come out his shell and let us stroke him. We knew at that point he was our cat.

He arrived in February and the first few days were interesting. He was terrified and spent all the time under the sofa. We knew he was starting to settle in when he stopped hiding under the sofa and started hiding behind it. We were given the top tip of bribing him with food. Over the next few weeks he started to build his confidence, explore the house, discovering the upstairs was a revelation.



he is a mischievous, naughty boy, we love him! He can't go out alone



because of the FIV, but we bought him a harness and he loves walking us around the garden. He is healthy and playful with a love of destroying carpets.

Cats Protection gave Sully a chance and we are so happy that we were allowed to give him a home.

The best thing we did this summer was to adopt a 2 and a half year old cat called Max, who was waiting patiently for a new home after being rescued by Cats Protection in Stockport.


Since arriving in August he has become part of the family and is a great character!

If course these are unusual times, and homing a cat during Covid meant that social distancing had to be observed. Fortunately Cats Protection provided lots of support and careful planning to ensure that the process was safe and effective. First they shared photos, a short film and Max's story to help build a picture. Then they sent lots of useful information and kept in touch by phone and on line to help plan for his arrival. They warned he might be a little nervous so we were well prepared.

On August 2nd this year, Max arrived at our house in his cat carrier with his own yellow blanket. We had everything ready, including his favourite food ... but he was terrified and dived under the sofa! Despite all coaxing he hardly appeared for 10 hours

It didnt take long after that, though for Max to make himself at home. First he began to make small explorations around the room. By the end of the week, he was sitting with us on the sofa, being very affectionate and welcoming lots of cuddles.

Since then he has gone from strength to strength and delights us every day. He has found all the most



comfortable places to snooze, and races around the house in between times. He loves chasing toys, treading old wool blankets and also occasional cat treats. He does have a mischievous streak, and enjoys batting people through the banisters if going upstairs. With his big friendly features, friends have likened him to a popular cartoon cat. He often makes us laugh, too.. he has adopted an old yellow draw string bag and drags it around like a prize trophy. In the last week he has begun to take some tentative steps outside in our small enclosed garden. His face was a picture, having never seen the sun, sky or flowers! He stayed very close to us but was fascinated by the butterflies!

Throughout the time since he was adopted, Cats Protection have offered encouragement, good advice and an easy, efficient paperwork system. He arrived in beautifully cared for condition, clean, healthy and house trained. All he was missing was a home! It was great to be able to share photos and videos of Max and hear feedback that he has blossomed and grown hugely (in confidence, not size!) with us. He is certainly now more vocal and also lets us know if, for example my son is sitting on the armchair which is rightfully his. It was also very reassuring to know, in return for a reasonable donation, that all necessary injections, microchipping and other procedures had been taken care of including the first month's pet insurance.

In summary I would encourage anyone who loves cats to consider adopting one. We are very glad we did and think Max would agree!.
