

# Hello Friends and Readers, Welcome to your Felines Newsletter - Summer 2020

It is difficult to know what to report of Branch activities in these unusual times - lockdown didn't just affect all of our lives, but also those of the cats we seek to help. Cats Protection nationally has been on full lockdown and all Branch activities ceased for the time being.

Trapping has been suspended, and our Summer neutering campaign curtailed, as without full time vet support it isn't possible to run the full activities of your Branch. We depend so much on the wonderful work of the Mount Veterinary Hospital to be on hand whenever we need them, so until they are able to operate safely for staff and visitors we must hold off.

Similarly just as we were ready to open our new foster pens, the shutters came down. Five lovely new pens, fully equipped and ready to take in cats seeking new homes - then like a television programme the 'pause' button had to be pressed. Hopefully we shall be up and running in the not too distant future.

On the domestic front, our cats declared summer early—with such a lovely April after one of the wettest winters on record, they decided kitchen door opening hours should be resumed. This year the swallows that nest in the garage rafters also turned up early. As they have a tendency to swoop into the kitchen at times, a new bead screen is now in place. The cats' initial wariness didn't last long and it saves having to rescue a swallow before a cat works out who the new visitor is.

## **Health advice for cats during Covid times**

#### Get plenty of rest

# Places to nap - regardless of the inconvenience you might cause









#### **Our new Foster Pens**

With our new foster pens close to completion in March, we could have hoped to hold a 'Grand Opening' in time to include in the Summer Felines - then circumstances beyond anyone's control intervened.

However, even without cats in care we can show some pictures of the new foster pens. Hopefully by the time we are full of cats looking for new homes, the mud patch that was the little outside area at the front, will have been turned into the planned wildlife garden. There will be nectar plants for bees & butterflies, and room for compostable waste.

Bird feeders are already in place and attracting all sorts of wild life. Branch co-ordinator David has put up a poster inside the kitchen area of the pens, identifying the birds that might be seen on a visit.

The bird feeders will provide live entertainment for our residents as well as an avian education to all volunteers who come to look after them, or to help socialise the cats before a forever home is found.

The pens themselves are inside a secure fenced area. Access is via a padlock requiring a number code. The larger site includes the Branch's store and also accommodates storage/work facilities for other organisations. There is a separate building with a communal kitchen with loos that also houses the washing machine for the Branch's use. Plus plenty of parking near our pens.

We shall need volunteers to clean and feed the residents of the 5 pens twice a day, together with anyone who feels more comfortable taking on a socialising role. So please get in touch with the Branch to offer your help, a regular slot, however infrequent, will be much valued. Full training will be provided.

# Before (in February) and after (in May).




Construction began at the end of 2019—cold and wet!

It was something of a muddy patch after all the rain in February.

Now in May in need of a hair cut, no doubt like many of us.

The outside garden is less of a mud patch now since we've had a couple of months of sunshine.

Access is via a central door, also with a coded padlock. The essential safety corridor within to access the pens.

Inside it is light and airy with the 5 individual pens in a row and the kitchen/work area at one end.



Inside sleeping area

Each pen has a cosy sleeping area with a heater, plus an internal door that can be closed when cold.

In the outside area there is a shelf and room for the cat forts that provide additional resting and climbing opportunities.

Sides between pens are opaque to reduce stress - no longer wire, but in a material now much easier to clean between residents.

## **Smokey & Shadow from Travelodge**



**Smokey** has turned out to be a very friendly boy and he is gorgeous! He is a complete foodie so has put on weight - we'll have to watch that a bit!

After being advised he would need to have his teeth looked at once he settled, he has now had three teeth removed and a polish and scale. Hopefully he'll be a lot more comfortable now and he's being a very good boy with his medication.

We didn't see **Shadow** for a few weeks after release but then all of a sudden she started appearing in the evenings. She is still very feral so I don't imagine that will change. But Smokey always seems pleased to see her and we see her at least once daily now popping back for food. They have the end of the catio with the cat tree and also an insulated cat box in there, which they enjoy

I'm pleased to say the rats who were hanging around the chickens have all cleared off now! I imagine that is likely Shadow more than Smokey! So we're really pleased about that as well. I think they enjoy playing in the fields beyond our garden, and when hanging out in the garden they just sit and watch the chickens, who definitely boss the cats around. Smokey is very tolerant of our dog as well even when he gets bouncy. I caught Smokey rubbing up against him and purring!

### Lucy's Law came into effect on 6 April

Lucy's Law will mean that kittens can't be sold by a third-party seller such as a pet shop or commercial dealer <u>unless</u> they have bred the animal themselves. Instead, anyone looking to buy or adopt a kitten under six months must either deal directly with the breeder or an animal rehoming centre.

To help the public responsibly find pets the government has launched its '*Petfishing*' campaign. You may have heard of 'catfishing', when someone creates a fictional online persona to lure a person into a relationship. Deceitful pet sellers often use a similar tactic to 'petfish' buyers, mistreating animals and selling them at high volume to line their pockets.

Cats Protection always encourages potential cat owners to consider adopting rather than buying a cat. Teaming up with cat and vet organisations to create a Kitten Checklist, designed to help potential owners ensure they choose a happy and healthy kitten. Please mention to friends and family who are thinking of taking on a kitten or cat. Far better to think of adopting from a reputable homing or branch foster centre such as Minim & Crotchet (below) two of the three 'musical kittens' homed by the Branch in the past.





As reported in The Times last month - cats may have lived with humans for thousands of years longer than previously thought; following hard upon the heels of the first mice.
