Cats Protection Update

Dear All ...

Whatever happened to the great British summer?

The constant rain, day after day, left everywhere waterlogged at the pens. Whilst we didn't have to resort to boats like some poor folk in some areas of the country, the persistent downpours didn't exactly help morale! The resident cats, however, seemed to ignore most of the rain, going about their 'business' despite wet fur. The occasional 'shake' and off they would go!

There isn't a great deal to report, to date homing has been very slow. The occasional burst of people wanting cats allowed us to home 11 during one of the weeks but daily calls now seem either to be requests for help with neutering or to take in unwanted, found, stray cats. This has reached an all-time high. Sadly, unwanted cats/kittens are just about everywhere. Neutering requests are almost non-stop, some people even decide it's a priority request at 11 o'clock at night. Whilst the neutering enquiries are welcomed, the numbers of people needing transport to the vets are just too many for 2 people to deal with. Hence a huge backlog.


Our vets in Gatley seem to be the most reasonably priced for neutering in the Greater Manchester area - therefore we can still offer £5 neutering to people in receipt of benefits, etc. This is in conjunction with vouchers from Headquarters. The problem is, the group's allocation of vouchers nowhere near matches demand. We exceeded our neutering grant months ago. Consequently we have to pay the costs. Something we are unable to sustain long term.

I regularly take 8-10 cats a week for neutering, Mel takes a similar number to Brooks in Hazel Grove. Between them, the vets are neutering 10+ cats daily and still we can't keep control over the vast numbers of un-neutered cats in the Greater Manchester area.

Wythenshawe is particularly bad, since the loss of Brenda and Carole Naylor, very little is being done in that area - unless, of course, people can take their own cats. Adswood, Brinnington, Reddish and Gorton are at crisis point. The whole area has become unmanageable.

We desperately need people to help transport some of these cats to the vets for neutering. This is to help members of the public who do not have transport, or who just wouldn't bother at all. It would involve collecting cats from their houses, taking them to the vets and, obviously, delivering them home after their ops. Sometimes it involves checking all is ok a couple of days later. Advice is also given on after-care.

Volunteers are also needed for the occasional vet run. Carol and Diana make regular weekly vet trips, allowing us to keep 'on top' of routine vaccinations, etc. and of course poorly cats and check ups for new cats. It's just the odd emergencies that arise when there are just no more hours left in the day.

A very distraught and disturbed cat came into our care. With the help of reiki, tlc by the bucketful and a lot of patience, ignoring the scratches and howling, the lashing out became less and howls became attempts at purrs. After many weeks we decided Jess was ready to be considered for homing. Thank you Janet Kiln for your patience when you first visited Jess. Her arrival at your home was just lovely. After the initial panic and culture shock of being in a home, Jess emerged from under the stairs, lay on the steps and folded her arms! "I have always lived here," the body language said. And guess what? She's fitted in perfectly. Jess helps on the laptop and computer keyboard when the family are working from home. Thanks to you all!



Ella went to live with her very own family, what a change from being kept as a breeding queen in order to sell kittens at the pet shop. Thank you Jeanette for your help rehabilitating Ella and her 2 babies, Pompom and Abigail. Stripe - who had been taken to the vets to be put to sleep, just needed a dental. She too has her very own family now.



These are just some of the homings that make everything worthwhile.

Linda has yet again helped with hand rearing. The surviving kitten, Snoopy, is totally bonkers. Offer a home if you dare; these were a litter of 4, only hours old brought to us by another charity. Sadly 3 died.

Welcome to Sarah, our newest volunteer, who's not been put off by poopicking! George, as part of his Duke of Edinburgh duties has spent hours socialising some very worried kittens. Thank you George.

Congratulations Andrea on your inaugural Fun Day success. A fabulous day, even the wet summer took a few hours break, giving us a brilliantly sunny day, that is until 4pm when just as we were clearing up rain it did.

The dog show was amazing, one class alone had over 50 entrants. Maria and her team were run off their feet, judging and taking entries. People sat on the grass, the queue for the ice-cream never got shorter all day, people were smiling and genuinely happy. I've never seen so many dogs in one place.

Fundraising is more difficult, the present economic climate has had a greater impact this year than last, and that, I would suggest, is reflected in the vast numbers of unwanted animals. We can only hope that cats that find themselves in our care, continue to be placed in those forever homes, and that the numbers we are unable to help, diminish.

May 2013 (I never imagined ever, that year would come) holds all you wish for. Please think of us if you are looking to offer a forever home to a cat/kitten.

What to do if you find an injured cat

Contact either the RSPCA or your local vet (or 24 hour emergency vet if out of hours) who can administer pain relief until the owner can be located. Put notices up in nearby shops giving information regarding the vets used.

What to do if you are unfortunate enough to find a dead cat

Take the cat to any vet who will scan for a microchip. The vet will dispose of the cat, should no owner be found. Notices can be put up in nearby shops, giving information regarding the vets used. Many owners want their cat back and vets will usually keep the cat for a few days.





The cafe owner said he had been hanging round the cafe for a few weeks and although they had started to feed him he wasn't allowed in the cafe so had no shelter whatsoever from the weather.

There was no way Heath could have got there by himself as there was only moors and wind turbines for miles in all directions so our conclusions are he had either been dumped or had got into someone's car and maybe jumped out there.

Heath looked in a sorry state having been attacked by a walkers dog a few days before, very thin and was bald in patches, and he had sores around his ears, despite all this he was friendly and obviously desperate for some



attention, there was no way he could stay out on open moors with winter coming and no access to any shelter and he urgently needed to see a vet.

Warren took the cafe owners number and said he would pass the details on to us at Stockport and we would contact a local cats protection group for them in Blackburn to see if they could help, unfortunately both local groups said they couldn't help him so we chatted to Jacky and it was decided we couldn't leave a cat in such a vulnerable state so we went back to pick him up.

Heath is now in our care and looking and feeling much better. He is approx 1 year old, and a very lively friendly little chap who loves to play, he is looking for his forever home on a quiet road preferably with no dogs.

Letter from Stockport's Scottish Outpost

One of our volunteers - Ginnie - moved to Scotland some years ago, along with several of the cats she cared for. Now she has a variety of animals and the cats keep us up to date!

Hello again, winter on its way. Very sadly we lost Harriet in June. Although she was still bright and eating, the cancer had progressed and was affecting her sight. I'm alright - had another course of expensive antibiotics for the Rhinitis and some chest x-rays which didn't show anything nasty going on, and Tabitha has had a lump removed and a dental (someone had to have one) and she is OK now too - but Ginnie has been floored because we lost Millie in July, and she had been her and Rob's constant companion for 19 years. Ginnie has a bit in Rainbow Bridge about them both.

Jack still has a urine leakage problem. They tried a new drug designed to improve muscle tone because he had got very leaky indeed and was going through puppy pads at a rate of knots. He didn't improve while he was on it but as soon as they stopped it he did. We await the next stage.

Another darned cat in the house. This one is a Persian called Corky and she goes about the place in sudden bursts like an animated powder puff. She came with quite a lot of baggage – fleas, ear mites, overactive thyroid – but that is all sorted now and fortunately we don't see much of her; just the occasional pastel coloured blur going by. I don't suppose she will be going anywhere now – nothing that comes here ever seems to get rehomed.

The badgers are still coming each evening for peanuts and the two adults, well behaved, just eat peanuts and leave, have been joined by a smaller one, Junior Badger, who is not so well behaved. He or she doesn't like peanuts but likes things which are found underground – under the lawn to be exact. It wasn't much of a lawn to begin with and it is even less of one now. Junior digs up great divots and scatters them about. He even decided to make his home in the old kiln, presumably reasoning that it saved the bother of digging a sett and was handy for the nice lawn and supplies. Rob went in one day to find planks and boxes scattered about and a big pile of badger poo in the middle of the floor. Even after they barricaded the door he did his best to dig his way back in. Why can't we have shy, retiring badgers like other people?

We also have a new sheep, a Welsh Mountain cross, black and very tubby, called leuan (pronounced Yie-an). He follows a bucket anywhere. 
Casper


Oliver eats owners diamond and opal necklace

My morning ritual is a sleepy stagger downstairs to be greeted by two of my five rescue cats awaiting their first treats of the day sat on the coffee table. No change there. So Amber was fed her treats and Oliver was given his treat stick, which he likes me to hold. Today I didn't have time. When I returned to the lounge all cats had departed to their respective sleeping areas and I went to retrieve my necklace and ring which I had placed on the table the night before. One ring but no necklace! I began to search the area and house half-heartedly and then this became more urgent as time progressed. I looked everywhere, twice.

I went in search of Oliver because he was the last one seen near it and I thought he may have been playing with it. He's sat at the top of the stairs minding his own business and wondering what I'm doing picking him up and prodding him. Then it dawned on me; no he couldn't have, impossible. Has he eaten my necklace whilst he was eating his treat? Can't be.



So after a Google search and a phone call to Greenbank; who all said highly unusual and improbably, it was the only conclusion I could come to. I phoned Steve and told him what I suspected and he too was also in disbelief. So off Oliver and I went to the RSPCA Hospital in Salford for an X-ray to confirm I was being silly. I wasn't. He'd eaten it, chain and all.



So Oliver was 'sectioned' and we all waited anxiously for nature to take it's course - it did but no necklace. The necklace had taken up residency in his stomach. So after nearly a week in hospital Oliver was operated on and the necklace was removed. Poor guy. At the time of his operation the BBC were following the Director of the RSPCA Hospital, David Yates, and recorded Oliver's operation as they too could not believe the story. What an ordeal poor Oliver has been through.

He is now home and recovering nicely, if a little lighter and has become quite infamous.
