Cats Protection across the UK



Cats Protection has put together the proposals in this document as a way to provide better legal protection for cats and the people who love them.

We are calling on politicians to enact these policies to help create a better world for our feline friends.

Cats are one of the nation's favourite pets, with 24% of adults choosing to own one¹. From young people to pensioners, millions enjoy the companionship, comfort and laughter that cats bring to a household. And for those living with health issues such as stress, anxiety or chronic medical conditions, a pet cat can greatly enhance their wellbeing.

Yet **despite their popularity, too many cats are victims of cruelty**, neglect and poor welfare practices.

Regulate to improve cat welfare

- License cat breeding to prevent cats being overbred and ensure kittens are healthy
- Ban the commercial sale of extreme cat breeds, such as the Scottish Fold, which are known to suffer health problems
- License animal rehoming activities to safeguard animal welfare and give the public greater confidence when adopting a rescue pet
- Introduce compulsory microchipping of pet cats to reunite more cats with their owners

Raise public awareness and enhance education on cat welfare

- Include animal welfare in the national curriculum to educate the pet owners of the future
- Introduce a 'pet safe' sticker on cut flowers to help consumers avoid flowers known to be toxic to cats
- Improve warnings on antifreeze products to inform or alert consumers that it is highly toxic to cats
- Raise public awareness of the risks involved in buying cats and other pets online

Protect cats from harm

- Introduce air gun licensing in England and Wales to allow greater transparency regarding air gun ownership and reduce the number of deliberate shootings of cats
- Ban the use of snares to prevent inhumane suffering of target and non-target animals, including cats
- Introduce restrictions on the public use of fireworks to reduce stress to cats, their owners and the wider community

Develop world-class animal welfare protection

- Require additional treatments and border checks for cats entering the UK to protect pets and public health
- Ban the consumption of cat meat to close loopholes which allow this inhumane practice
- Improve labelling of fur products for consumers to allow them to make informed purchasing choices

Break down barriers and recognise benefits of pet ownership

- Encourage private landlords to allow tenants to keep cats
- Ensure health professionals and social workers consider the role cats and other pets play in improving wellbeing
- Include consideration of companion animals which are already part of a person's household in individual care assessments
