Meet the furry bikers! - says our coordinator, Mark

Volunteers from the Woking branch of Cats Protection were recently contacted about four kittens that had been found living rough outside Dave Goddard Motorcycles in Cranford, just east of Heathrow airport. The owner of the business was, understandably, very concerned about their wellbeing and enlisted the help of Samantha Reed in a rescue operation.

The four gorgeous kittens were all extremely scared, hungry and very wary of humans. Eventually, Samantha, Dave and his employees were able to capture three of the kittens and their mum, and Samantha not only contacted us about them but then kindly delivered them into our care. The fourth kitten was caught a few days later and was immediately reunited with his family.

After seeing them settled into a clean and warm pen with a good supply of healthy food and clean litter, the time came to choose some names. Kim, their carer, eventually settled on (from left to right) Suzuki, Harley, Aprilia and Maeving, or as they're now collectively known, the Furry Bikers.

They were taken to the vets for a checkup, who gave them all a clean bill of health as well as precautionary treatment for fleas and worms.

We were lucky to find them at the age they were, even a week or so more of rough living is likely to have seen them become totally feral, and having to take their chances in what can be a very unfriendly world for a kitten. Even so, proving to them that not all humans are not out for their blood took a great deal of time, patience and persistence.

All of them are now well on their way to finding a loving, permanent home. They're much more comfortable around people now and are guite happy to sit on a lap and exercise their little engines, even Maeving who keeps forgetting he's electric.

I'd like to thank all the volunteers in Woking branch whose skill and dedication got them to this stage, in particular, Kim, their main carer.

I'd also like to publicly thank Dave of Dave Goddard Motorcycles and Samantha Reed for their prompt action and their generous donation. It has, without doubt, given these little guys every reason to look forward to a long and happy life in a very loving home

Treasurer's report

When I first started volunteering for Woking Cats Protection it seemed we had a more defined kitten season but as this newsletter goes to print, we sadly still have kittens in our pens. It now seems that we are rarely without them, despite many years of offering free neutering. There is probably never going to be a solution to this problem so we do the best we can for the fortunate ones that come our way.

To date this year we have spent £22,865 on neutering 171 females and 158 males.

We have had some truly heartbreaking stories this year, but the team have stepped up to the challenge, not always with the result hoped for, but always there for the cat.

We have also had some very heartwarming stories, like Willow, our "Fitzpatricks" cat (page 23) who, without a very generous donation from Jenny and the determination of Kim our Welfare Leader, might not be living the active life she now has today.

None of this can be achieved without our amazing welfare team of fosterers, socialisers, transporters, trappers, the fundraising team and lastly, all of the "star" people listed here who donate on a monthly or regular basis, nominate our branch to receive donations when they participate in a sponsored event, or those who just go out of their way.

I hope you recognise yourselves and I sincerely apologise to anyone I may have missed, a massive thank you from the committee.

And finally, on a practical note, it would help enormously if I can claim all the gift aid that we are entitled to. As many of you now pay your membership online, I can't be sure that I have your current gift aid status. And some members who contact me by post don't always tick the box to indicate whether or not you are a taxpayer and therefore whether I can claim the gift aid on your behalf. Remarkable rescues

Maurice the miracle cat

When Woking Cats Protection volunteer Louise was visiting her parents in the Lake District last October, she and her mum went on a fell walk. After climbing Red Screes in rain and high winds they had planned to walk down a ridge into Ambleside. The weather changed their plans and instead they took the Scandale valley route – and as Louise explains, she was very glad they did!

It was still raining, very windy and we were about three miles from Ambleside in pretty miserable conditions... just off the path and crouching by a clump of rushes was a Siamese cat! He was very thin, wet, shivering but alive. I wrapped him up in my fleece jumper and carried him down off the fells. He wriggled and meowed for a while until I think he realised that I was trying to help him. We got a few strange looks and questions as we passed walkers, but hurried down the valley as he was not in a good way.

We managed to make contact with the vet in Ambleside so they were expecting us, but it still took about two hours to walk the three miles downhill as we had to cross many rivers that were flooding the path. The first thing the vet did was to scan for a microchip; it was a great feeling when the machine beeped!

This is where the story gets even more amazing! The owner lives in Cambridge and Maurice had gone missing from Hartsop Hall on 23 September, whilst they were on holiday. He had survived almost a month and travelled a long way over the fells. She set off straight away to drive from Cambridge to the Lake District to collect him.

Maurice was given food and water, and had many ticks removed. We then transferred him to the vet in Windermere, where we left him in their capable hands. The following day I got a lovely call from Maurice's owner when she was back home in Cambridge. He had lost a lot of his weight and was anaemic, but recovering from his adventure. Since then I have received further Maurice updates and he is doing well. As a thank you for rescuing her Miracle Maurice, his owner has made a generous donation to Woking Cats Protection which will help make a better life for vulnerable cats and kittens in our care.

Mayhem on the M25!

Were you stuck on the M25 on a Friday night last September? If so, it was all in a good cause – at least that's what we at Cats Protection think! The traffic was brought to a halt for an amazing rescue of a young cat who had the misfortune to find itself on the motorway, dodging vehicles and trying to get to safety. In its panic, it jumped into the chassis of a car that was slowing down and the occupants had the good sense to pull onto the hard shoulder immediately and seek help.

Three Fire Service crews responded to their call, closing the motorway for an hour so they could work in safety and finally extract the kitten from the engine. Crew Commander Kevin Mitchell from Woking Fire Station rang Woking CP Lost and Found Officer, Sue, and we are delighted to report that the car's owners decided to adopt the very brave and immensely fortunate kitten, who is now – obviously – called Lucky!

We can't thank the Fire Service enough for their unbelievable compassion and skill at rescuing the vulnerable little feline.

Campaigning for cats

A post-General Election update from the Cats Protection Advocacy, Campaigns & Government Relations Team

The Cat Manifesto

Ahead of the UK General Election in July 2024 Cats Protection launched The Cat Manifesto which is a definitive guide of everything decision makers need to do to make the UK a better place for cats. As part of this campaign over 30,000 emails were sent to candidates standing in the General Election across the UK. Every candidate received at least one email (some have had over 30!). Exactly 644 candidates from across the political spectrum responded to the campaign and 114 of these candidates have now become MPs including Liz Kendall (Secretary of State for Work and Pensions), Daisy Cooper (Lib Dem Deputy Leader) and Adrian Ramsey (co-leader of the Green Party). Many candidates also took to social media to share pictures of their cats.

Pet theft now a specific crime

On 24 August, the Pet Abduction Act came into force in England and Northern Ireland. This important piece of legislation makes the theft of a cat or a dog a specific offence and recognises the emotional and welfare impact the theft of a pet has on pets and their owners. This will hopefully deter unscrupulous individuals from stealing pets as well enabling the police to better record this type of theft. Cats Protection has been a leading voice on this issue and campaigned to ensure that cats were given the same rights as their canine counterparts. With the Act now in force, Cats Protection has been featured in 544 media articles, reaching a total audience of 4.4 billion. This included broadcast coverage on BBC Breakfast (TV), numerous BBC national and regional radio stations, and multiple national titles including The Times, Telegraph, Daily Mail, Guardian, Independent and Mirror.

Voluntary sector: House of Lords debate

The contribution of Cats Protection volunteers, along with other leading animal welfare charities, was recognised during a House of Lords Debate on the voluntary sector in November 2024. Lord Black of Brentwood said, "Every day, the UK's largest animal welfare charities – Cats Protection, Dogs Trust, RSPCA, Blue Cross, Battersea and PDSA – do astonishing work on limited resources that is made possible by the work of around 29,000 volunteers, contributing an average of 2.5 million hours of work each year. Cats Protection values its 9,000 volunteers' priceless gift of time at around £37 million each year... As Cats Protection says to its volunteer army, and it is the same across the sector, 'We wouldn't be here without you' ".

Willow's progress - from fragile kitten to resilient survivor

Last August a tiny three-month-old kitten named Willow arrived in the care of Woking Cats Protection. Early on, she faced a battle with several bacterial infections, overcoming them with extended courses of antibiotics. As she began to recover, a concerning issue with her knees became apparent. Whether sitting or walking, her knees seemed misaligned.

After a series of vet visits and x-rays, Willow was diagnosed with patellar luxation in both knees – her kneecaps were dislocating, causing significant discomfort. The solution required patience and precision. Weeks of cage rest followed and then Willow was referred to the renowned Fitzpatrick Referrals. There, the skilled surgeon Mario Coppola performed delicate surgeries on both her knees. Post-surgery, Willow faced six further weeks of cage rest accompanied by twice-daily physiotherapy exercises. Her resilient spirit shone through as she allowed the exercises, proving herself a trooper. She passed her post-operative check with flying colours and began several sessions of hydrotherapy, quickly becoming a favourite with the team at Fitzpatrick's.

After a long journey of recovery and perseverance, Willow has finally found her forever home. Her story is a testament to resilience and the extraordinary efforts of those who cared for her. Willow's treatment was kindly funded by a donation in memory of Jenny Ingoe, a long-term volunteer with Woking Cats Protection, by her children Neal and Alison.



Skye's the limit!

The last time I owned (I was owned) by a cat was over 25 years ago. But due to a change in circumstances, I happened to be on the lookout for a fluffy companion and stumbled upon Skye's photo on the Woking Cats Protection web page, and was instantly smitten.



Skye's details said she had been rescued as a stray living on farmland. After discussing her with my family, I applied online and was contacted by Pauline to chat about whether I was a suitable candidate to adopt Skye. Pauline then arranged to meet me and my adult son at the foster carer's house so we could be introduced to Skye.

Skye seemed a bit shy at first but took an instant shine to us. I thought Skye was absolutely adorable. We arranged a suitable handover date and Skye duly arrived. At first I spent some time attempting to persuade Skye to come out from under the dining table. Luckily, the lure of her dinner was too powerful for her to deny it. Skye then spent a few weeks being the most boring, dull cat ever – she spent a lot of time quietly hiding away, only coming out for food and a visit to the litter tray. She then progressed to coming and sitting on the sofa next to me and we discovered a mutual affection. She is very partial to a gentle tummy rub. I was concerned that she was not like my previous cats, but I soon discovered some of the reasons for her behaviour after reading up on some cat psychology.

1. Fear of going outside: as a farm cat, it must have been scary not having a safe place to sleep, having to hunt for all her food, avoiding predators and other bully cats.

2. Stairs: she had never seen any and couldn't work out their purpose – or how to get down them. She tried this only twice and has worked out it's not worth the bother. No cat hair in the bedrooms – hurrah!

3. Loud noises: she ran for the hills, or at least under the dining table if she heard a loud noise nearby (such as me doing the washing up in a hurry, the telephone or the doorbell ringing).

4. Excessive purring and drooling: she is showing me she is ever so pleased to be living with me and not terrified or stressed.

To say she has blossomed is an understatement as she now goes outside whenever she wants, she greets me every morning with a miaow and rubs up against my legs – but I think it's probably more to do with the fact it must be her breakfast time – and she is bright and perky every day. We have settled into a mutual love and respect for one another.

All my children adore her and many photos have been taken and shared amongst interested friends and family. Skye revels in lording it over my garden and can often be seen sunning herself on the lawn when it's not raining. She especially enjoys the wild patch of garden by the shed – maybe memories of the old farm? She's even beginning to challenge the magpies that dare to invade her space, but only from a safe distance under the shrubbery.

I am so very grateful for Pauline's assistance in helping introduce me to Skye, and the followup calls and messages of support. Thank you to everyone for your dedication in helping rehome all your cats – where would they be without you?
