After the events stopped, Marion continued to cultivate plants for us to sell in the shop.

Now, however, after four decades of helping our branch, she is stepping down.

We're very grateful for all her efforts and marked her 'retirement' with a bouquet of flowers.

Our shop manager Jacqui said: "We say a sad farewell to Marion. She and her husband John joined



our branch as members in 1981 and soon after they started to grow lovely plants from seed for us.

"Once the events stopped, they would bring them to our shop and became well known because the plants were of such good quality. As soon as they arrived, they were snapped up by customers.

"Sadly John passed away in 2015 but

Marion continued to keep us supplied.

"However the time has come to hang up her trowel and we would like to say a huge thank you from everyone on the branch."

It all started when a ginger cat appeared in Marion and John's garden in Lee and they took him in, naming him Ginger, of course.

The couple went on to rehome six cats from our branch. Marion, 86, wrote to say: "It was a pleasure to be doing what I like - growing plants - and to know that the proceeds helped all those cats."

She signed off as "The plant lady" which is how we will always fondly think of her and wish her all the best for the future.

HOURS of dedicated care from our welfare officer Diane saved these kittens and set them up for a new happy life.

Peanut and Poppy had been born outside in a garden in New Eltham where the householder was feeding their semi-feral mum. Unfortunately the cat was disturbed and abandoned her litter, leaving them helpless.

The tiny kittens came to Diane when they were only two days old, covered in mud from being outside.

She began the demanding task of bottlefeeding them but sadly a third female sibling died after a week.

The fate of the surviving pair hung in the balance as they were very ill and needed lots of care and help from our vet at Passey Place. Peanut, a ginger male *(above)*, had to be put on a drip for a couple of days. But he and his sister Poppy, a dark tortie *(right)*, were little battlers and gradually they pulled round, becoming stronger and healthier.

By the age of three months, they were ready to be homed. This was later than normal because they were a bit small for their age and we had to wait until they had gained enough weight to have their vaccinations. The kittens have now been homed and their mum was neutered to be returned to the care of the lady who had been looking after her.

TEDDY BOYS!



THE stairwell of a block of flats is no place for any cat to live but sadly this had been the fate of two brothers for most of last year. Ted, *above left*, and Jasper belonged to one of the tenants who started being away from home for long periods after her relationship broke down.

Sadly she made no provision for her pets but neighbour llona and other kind residents began feeding the boys and giving them warm bedding. They also let Ted and Jasper into the building in Sidcup when it was raining or cold. The owner of the three-yearolds did not allow them into her home even when she was there and told neighbours they were on a waiting list to be taken into care. But the situation dragged on and on with no help arriving for the boys. Ilona then approached several charities but without success until she contacted us in a heartrending email.

She wrote: "The situation is dire, how long can these two lovely cats keep living like this? It's so sad. Me and my neighbours either have cats or dogs so aren't in a position to adopt. Me and another neighbour feed them daily but I can't continue to do this. I just want them to find a forever home.

"I understand that the cats don't belong to me but the owner is happy for me to try and get help for them. "She won't ever have the cats at home or let them in or feed them. She just isn't in a position to give the cats the love and attention they both really deserve. Can you help?"

After a couple of weeks on our waiting list and checking that the owner would allow us to help them, we had the space to take in Ted and Jasper, finally ending their time living in the stairwell. Despite their ordeal, the boys had kept their lovely natures. After settling in with us, Diane put them on our website, writing: "They are the most affectionate boys you are likely to meet. Ted loves to be carried around like a baby and Jasper is just as affectionate."

The brothers attracted lots of attention and inquiries before being reserved after only a few days online. They were adopted by Naomi to finally start their new lives in a loving home.

FOSTERING: It's really simple and incredibly rewarding you look after a cat/s giving them lots of TLC while we pay all the bills. When they find a home, you wave them off to a new life before welcoming the next cat in need. Cats Protection has a very helpful online training course and our welfare officer Diane offers plenty of support. TREASURER: This involves keeping tabs on our financial ins and outs. Most of our transactions are online or by direct debit, making it quicker and easier. Financial experience would be a bonus but the main requirement is to be organised. Our head office offers training and support.

PROMOTE NEUTERING: We need someone to put up small posters in community centres, libraries, noticeboards, shops etc - anywhere where people will see them. This will help us reach as many owners as possible to cut the number of unwanted kittens and is flexible as it can be done whenever you have time.

Break for KitKat

CUTIES Custard and KitKat were very sweet kittens who lived up to their names. They were from different litters and owners but sadly were both not wanted and came into us separately.

Dark tortie Custard and tabby KitKat were very similar ages and when the time came, they were chosen by Dorothy and her family to go and live with them in Orpington. They were certainly wanted there and will be much-loved pets. Tabby boy Obi was also rejected after his owner's cat had a litter. She decided to keep two ginger kittens but not him!

He was a very nice character and fine on his own so when he was old enough, Obi was on his way to a new loving home with Bella and her partner in Sidcup.

CIAO BELLA!

BELLA is a striking girl, mostly white with a tabby face, ears and paws, which our vet said was due to her being part-Siamese. But, despite her sweet character and lovely looks, this year-old girl was sadly left behind when her owner moved. She was being fed by a neighbour but was not neutered so inevitably had a litter.

The kittens were cared for and then homed by the lady who was feeding them but Bella was being attacked by a male cat so came into us. She was spayed ready for rehoming and was then off to a fresh start with Louise in Eltham. Black-and-white Luna, inset right, had been acquired as a kitten but was being bullied by the two resident cats. Her owner asked for help when Luna was aged five months and she was fostered as we arranged her vaccinations and neutering.

We had two possible owners on our waiting list so were aiming to have her settled in a new home as soon as possible. Meanwhile Penny, *right*, a friendly tabby-and-white girl, was finding life difficult with her family's young children. The youngsters were too much for the 11month-old so she came into our care.

Penny had been well looked after and was already spayed and micro-chipped. As no vet treatment was needed, we were able to rehome her quickly to Tina and her mum in Plumstead who were on our waiting list.



WHO remembers the story of the three kittens who used to live in our shop?

For our supporters and customers who recall the trio, Jacqui tells their story right back from when it all began.

She said: "I had a call from one of the shopkeepers in Westmount Road, Eltham, where the flat above the shop was empty and the ceilings were falling down, stairs collapsing and it was generally in a bad condition.

"But a few days before, they had seen a mum cat bringing her young kittens from the railway (one by one) into the flat. 'When I went to investigate, I found that the kittens were about eight-weeks-old and knew the art of hissing at a human and showing very short, sharp teeth.

"It didn't take me long to realise that I was not going to be able to pick them up so returned the following day armed with a cat trap. It took a few attempts but soon I had caught all three plus their mum.

"The litter of Minstral, Sherbet (*main picture, right*) and their all-black sister Black Jack (*inset*) was taken to our shop in Well Hall.

"After some TLC, the mum was neutered and, as she turned out to be friendly, we were able to rehome her with a nice family.

"But the kittens were another kettle of fish. Our helpers tried really hard to bring them round so they could also be adopted but the cats were happy to live at the shop. They had free rein to explore out the back and roam around to come and go as they pleased.

"It took about 18 months for them to be confident enough to be stroked and all seemed OK. Then tragedy struck one Sunday when Minstral tried to get across the road and was hit by a car. Sadly he didn't survive.

"It was with a heavy heart that I decided the other two should be moved to stop them suffering a similar fate.

"Sherbet was homed to a family who I know and went to live in Rochester where he had woods at the back of the house for miles. He would spend most of his time exploring but always appeared at meal times.

"Sherbet opted not to go into the house and had his own shelter in the garden. Life was good for him until he was clipped by a car one day. After a short spell in the vets, he was brought home and started living indoors.

"The other two resident cats were a little suspicious of him being there at first but soon got over that. Now Sherbet loves being inside and has become a loving lap cat.

"Black Jack was the most timid of the three and would hiss when you went near her but she never tried to scratch or lash out.

"I took her home with me to give her extra TLC and socialising, and she was there for a few months until a couple offered her a good home. Or at least I thought so then - but we all get it wrong sometimes.

"The new owners lived locally to me and I stressed how important it was to keep Black Jack in for at least four weeks and even then we should reassess her to see how she was coping with the move.

"After some time, I contacted them to ask how things were and was horrified to be told she had got out in the first few days but they hadn't even let me know. I put up some notices and hoped she would be found as she was microchipped.

"But I didn't hear any news and feared she probably hadn't survived.

"Now skip ahead about three or four years when I had a call from the Bromley branch of Cats Protection to ask if I

could scan a stray cat in Orpington. As it was a house that almost backed onto me, I called round to have a chat with the lady and recognised Black Jack straight away.

"Her story was that she had arrived at this house a few years ago looking very bedraggled, losing her fur and very hungry.

"Luckily for BJ, this family took pity on her and started to feed her. They put a little shelter outside for her and all was OK.

"The reason for the call to Cats Protection was because she had recently started to go into the house and make herself at home. This wouldn't have been a problem but they have two large dogs which had to be kept away from the cat (now called Lou) and were no longer able to roam the house.

"So Lou came back into our care and is looking for a new home, somewhere she can just be left to look out of a window and have a comfy place to sleep.

"A home with dogs or young children would not be suitable although I think she could live with other cats as long as she has a bolt hole if she needed a bit of space.

HANDSOME ginger boy Rufus needed a new home when his owner moved abroad.

The seven-year-old went on our website where his listing read: "He has a beautiful nature, very loving and enjoys all the fuss his fosterer showers on him. Rufus is a very attractive boy, enjoys playtimes and even likes a brush!"

It didn't take long for him to be snapped up and Rufus went off to a new home with Marc in Beckenham Another male we helped was Timmy, who was reported to us as a stray in poor condition.

We arranged for him to go to our vet for neutering and it was clear he needed more than that as he was covered in fleas and not in good health.

So Timmy stayed at Passey Place for some extra TLC and antibiotics before going to a fosterer.

She says he is a beautiful and loving boy who is now enjoying his home comforts.

Timmy still needs the all-clear from the vet but we're happy he's back on track and hope to put him up for homing soon.

Tabby Gaz and all-black Eric are affectionate lads whose owner sadly had to go into a care home because of dementia.

His family asked for help and the six-year-olds came in, quickly showing they were lovely cats, enjoying attention and playtime.

They would make super pets and Adam in Lee was the lucky one who took them off for a fresh start with him.





BACK FUR GOOD

OUR volunteer Sam runs our lost and found page on Facebook, monitoring and updating it daily to help owners whose cats have gone missing.

Speed is of the essence when trying to get them back home as theses two stories show.

Sam writes: "I live on the Progress Estate and since the pandemic started we have had an active community WhatsApp group.

"In July, one of my neighbours shared an urgent message about her missing cat Mila, *above right*. She is a very special pet as she provides therapeutic support to the family's child, who has additional needs, so they were desperate to find her.

"I posted Mila's details on our Facebook page and the next day I received a message from a kind-hearted member of the public who had found Mila in her garden.

"She and her husband did a great job of encouraging Mila to stay put while I quickly contacted the owner, who immediately rushed over to collect her.

"Mila was very close by and thanks to the kind people who found her is now safely home with her family.

"Another plea for help came from a family whose young cat Opal, *below right*, had gone missing and they were desperate to find him.

"Remarkably a local vet nurse from Park Vets in Sidcup saw the appeal post and instantly recognised Opal as the cat who had been handed into the surgery earlier that day.

"What didn't add up though is that Opal was microchipped but the vet had not been able to use this to trace his owner.

"It turned out that when his chip was implanted, it had not been registered with the owner's details.

'I studied the pictures and was sure it was the same cat so took the microchip number from the owner and checked with the vet and the numbers matched!

"Thanks to the diligence of the vet nurse, Opal was reunited with his family. We are so grateful to the person who handed him in and to the lovely staff who took care of him.

"This tale serves as a timely reminder to get your chip checked and make sure the details are registered and up-to-date. Then if a pet goes missing, it can be traced to the owner quickly and easily so they can be reunited."
