We have had *unprecedented* interest in a litter of 6 stray ginger kittens - all now reserved - that came from an enclave of ginger feral cats in Roydon Hamlet. We worked with RSPCA Stort Valley and The Scratching Post on this colony.

We have a few more stories on the ginger theme to illustrate our recent work. We are keeping a close eye on the welfare of an old boy in poor health previously reported to us as a stray but reclaimed by his owner who is now, with our encouragement, looking after him properly. We have also taken in Gizmo, a cat who was being fed by one of our supporters after having been abandoned when his owners moved away; he will go to his new home in a few days. Fosterer Carolyn will adopt her charge Thomas, an affectionate elderly ginger stray with a few (manageable) health problems who was handed in at the vets and whose days were probably numbered had we not intervened.

As a result of taking in some sad cases, we have been hit with big vet bills, so any financial contribution towards these is welcome. An update on Amy's case, that you might have been following in past issues, is below.



Amy saw the specialist at the Animal Health Trust in Newmarket and, given his verdict on the state of her left eye, it was decided that her quality of life would be much improved if it were removed, saving her from possible pain and the stress of thrice-daily eye drops. She has adapted brilliantly with one eye and is happier.



She will still need her daily drops in the other eye, and it kept under observation, but we know she now has a bright future.

Lissa, their fosterer, has done so much for Amy and will be sorry to see them both go, but glad to get her spare room back, no doubt, and comforted by Amy's prospects.

The stable cat would surely be Crouched curious and shy Adding her contented purr To that strange lullaby.


Kits close huddled by her side Half-hidden in the hay The stable warmed by mother love On that first Christmas Day.

Call of the cats: what I learnt about life and love from a feral colony by Andrew Bloomfield.

When aspiring screenwriter Andrew Bloomfield moved into a bungalow in Southern California, he soon discovered that he shared the property with a large colony of feral

cats - untamed, uninterested in human touch, not purring pets in waiting.

But after a midnight attack by predators that decimated yet another litter of kittens, Bloomfield decided to intervene. He began to name and nurse, feed and house, rescue and neuter.

Drawing on his time living in Asia among spiritual teachers, he takes us on the contemplative, humorous, and poignant journey of saving these cats, only to find it was they who saved him by revealing a world of meaning beyond his unrealised Hollywood dreams.


