COURGETTE
SOUP*



Diana Lamont one of our committee members shares another of her favourite recipes





Ingredients

- 60ml/2froz extra virgin olive oil
- 1 tbsp chopped garlic
- Handful basil leaves (preferably Italian), chopped
- Sea salt and ground white pepper, to taste
- 1kg/2¼lb green courgettes, cut lengthways into quarters then into 1cm/½in slices
- 750ml/1¼ pint chicken stock
- 60ml/2froz single cream
- Handful flat leaf parsley, chopped
- 50g/2oz freshly grated parmesan, plus extra to serve

Directions

1. Heat the oil in a heavy-based pan over a medium heat.
2. Cook the garlic, basil, salt and courgette slowly for 10 minutes, or until the courgettes are lightly browned and softened.
3. Add white pepper, to taste, then pour in the stock and simmer for 8 minutes, uncovered. Remove from the heat.
4. Put three-quarters of the soup mixture into a food processor and blend until smooth.
5. Return the mixture to the pan and stir in the cream, parsley and parmesan.
6. To serve, ladle the soup into a bowl and season, to taste, with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
7. Sprinkle over more parmesan, to taste.
8. Serve with crusty bread and a green salad.

CHARLIE by Janet Warren

In November 2018 a black and white male cat was taken to our vets and signed over to Cats Protection for rehoming.

When the cat was examined immediately upon seeing him it was obvious why the owners had handed him over and rushed out so quickly - Charlie was very sick and in a terrible state.

The vet and nurse had to gown-up and wear protective gloves to examine Charlie - it was suggested that he could have the calicivirus and was, no doubt, highly infectious.

As there was nowhere that would take an infectious cat, vets or cattery, a branch volunteer set up her summerhouse at the end of her garden for Charlie. The summerhouse had electricity so it was heated in the colder months.

Precautions had to be taken when in contact with Charlie such as wearing protective medical clothing (looking like someone out of a TV crime programme) and using animal sanitisers at all times when feeding and handling him.

Over quite a few months of being medicated and then vaccinated Charlie spent his time with CP between the summerhouse which got the sunshine during the day, (Charlie loved to sunbathe), and the cattery. Along the way he had various treatments and surgeries.

As time went by he became a handsome, healthy-looking boy, as you can see from the photo, and quite a character.

When the cattery closed last November Charlie was transferred to one of CP's Homing Centres. He was loved by everyone there and often got up to mischief.

At the end of January he finally went to his forever home where he settled in immediately, exploring every room and bed in the house, and is adored and spoilt by his human family.

So that's Charlie's heart-warming story. A long history (15 months) of ups and downs for him, but with such a lovely, happy ending.
