Often we get cats here at the Centre that have a few health problems and need quite a bit of initial veterinary care and TLC to help them on their way. Sadly, many of these cats often get overlooked by our visitors and find themselves staying with us for many months.

All our long-stay cats get lots of love and personalised daily socialisation programmes to ensure their well-being, but we are always delighted when someone comes along and is prepared to offer them a home. Here's an update on three of our 'special needs' cats featured in our appeals in previous newsletters.

JELLYBEAN

Fourteen year-old Jellybean came to us back in March due to her owner moving. Sadly, she had a few health issues and needed a thyroidectomy. This, combined with her age, meant that she became one of our long-stay cats. However, after five months of waiting, it was her turn to find a loving home. Here's what her new family told us:

"I was looking to adopt an older cat to give her a comfy place to spend her time. As soon as I saw Jellybean in the cattery, I knew she was the one.





On the day we brought her home, Jelly surprised us completely – she just walked out of the cat carrier and onto the carpet and made herself comfy very quickly. She was affectionate right from the start and was super-eager to rub against us and get to know us.

Jellybean has to be one of the most beautiful cats I have ever met. She is a bubbly, affectionate girl who loves to greet me every time I come back from work. She is always the best thing to come home to. She has very chilled-out days, either lying in the sun on the decking (being the older lady she is), or right in the middle of my comfy double bed. Of course, I have to lay around her as she gets top priority.

Jellybean is perfect. She is my first cat and has blossomed my love for cats completely.

COOPER

Cooper arrived at our Centre in May. He had been suffering from a urinary condition and his owners found it difficult to cope. They were on the verge of putting him to sleep, but luckily the vets suggested that Cats Protection might be able to help, taking him into care and finding another home for him. After many months of trying to find him a home, one lovely family came to visit and fell in love with him. Here's what they told us.

"Both of our young children were quite nervous around animals, so we decided that a child-friendly cat would be best for them.







We first saw Cooper on the website and decided that we would give him a visit. That weekend, we popped in to see him and both of our children were completely at ease with him and spent the next few days talking all about Cooper. He had made quite the impression, and despite having a bit of a medical history, we felt that we could give him the love and care he needed to feel stress-free, as well as a very busy home to

keep him entertained.

Cooper has settled in amazingly. He loves playing in the garden now, chasing our feet first thing in the morning before his breakfast and running with his toy mouse around the house (with the kids joining in too!) and his health has been perfect.

He is the most cuddly, fun, handsome cat ever and is completely part of our family. We love him!

PURDY

Purdy originally came into our care back in April 2018 and was very soon adopted.

Unfortunately, Purdy started spraying around the house and there was clearly a problem. Neither the vets nor behaviour experts could understand why. Eventually her owner couldn't cope any more and brought her back.

We soon found out that Purdy had a urinary infection and she was immediately put on a long course of antibiotics and antiinflammatories. This, together with a special socialisation programme, high-quality food, and the use of Pet Remedy and Zylkene (to reduce stress), helped Purdy improve dramatically and she appeared much happier. Could it have been she had always had this urine infection, which had simply gone undetected?

And could Purdy now at last be rehomed again? A resounding YES!!

An understanding adopter came forward and in May 2019, Purdy left for her forever home. Thankfully Purdy has never sprayed in her new home, which she shares with the resident budgie! Needless to say, she is very interested in her feathered companion.

Purdy's mum tells us "Purdy is extremely affectionate and loves exploring the fields behind the house. I'm so pleased I gave Purdy the chance she deserved"

ADOPTING AN OLDER CAT

A NEW HOME FOR ORLY

Being a volunteer at Cats Protection over a period of some 25 years, I have come into contact with so many lovely cats and kittens of all ages, colours and personalities. I love each and every one of them, but sometimes a certain one comes along that pulls at your heart strings. It happened to me in August, when I met 18-year-old tabby girlie Orly.

In June, my heart had been broken because we had to let our beautiful Merlin go to Rainbow Bridge when he was diagnosed with a brain tumour. He was our youngest furbaby at just under 11-years-old and we have Marti who's 20 and Minky (another CP rescue we have had since 2002) age 17. Merlin would never accept another cat into our family so I had steeled my heart when certain cats or kittens had taken my eye but, when the pain of losing him lessened slightly, I began to think that maybe giving another cat a loving home would help my husband and I to heal.

I always feel so sorry for older cats who have come into care through no fault of their own. Although I know they are welllooked after and cared for at the Centre, it is not the same as being in the loving home that they have been used to all their lives.

When I first held Orly's bony little body in my arms and was rewarded with purrs and dribble, my heart melted. At first I decided to wait and see if someone else would come forward and offer her a loving home but, deep inside, I think I knew from the start that Orly was coming home with me. At 18, I felt she would settle in well with my 17 and 20-year-olds, as their day consists of eating, drinking and napping - something that they could all do together.



ADOPTING AN OLDER CAT



Taking on an older cat can be so rewarding; they love their home comforts and Orly, who we now call Molly, just revels in being able to curl up on the bed in the sunshine or cuddle up on our laps. She hardly stops purring and as soon as she sees us, she chats away telling us how grateful she is to be part of the household. She has also blossomed in the two weeks we have had her, gaining in weight and definitely feeling less bony day-to-day.

Of course we don't know how long we will have Molly (Orly), but I have come to realise that life is not predictable anyway. We will give her the best things in life for however long she is with us and, when the time comes, we will do the kindest thing we can for her, however hard that may be. Fostering-to-adopt is an option offered by Cats Protection and is a good way of seeing if an older cat will settle with existing furries. We have had no trouble with Marti and Minky accepting Molly so. after two weeks, we signed the adoption papers and she is now officially part of the Brook household. I would urge anyone to think about adopting older cats in CP care as it is a very rewarding experience and makes such a difference to these beautiful senior kitizens. We are so hoping we will have Molly for many more years to come; after only just over two weeks, we love her to bits.

Thank you to all the staff at CP who helped and encouraged me to make the decision I knew was destined to be from the start.

HELP! MY CAT'S GONE MISSING

It's a desperate time when your cat goes missing. Follow our checklist of what to do...

SEARCH EARLY

Cats are territorial, so a lot of cats that are missing are often found in the first few days within roughly a five-house radius from where they live. Cats that are new to the area, or shy cats, may have panicked and gone into survival mode, so are probably hiding even closer. They are too scared to move and will probably not respond to your calls. So check your garden and garage thoroughly and also those of your neighbours. Don't forget to ask the local kids - they tend to notice animals.

□ CHECK UNDER AND IN EVERYTHING

If they're injured or scared, they'll often be hiding in or under something. Your cat might be hiding in the unlikeliest of places – from cupboards to bin stores. Don't underestimate your kitty's shrinkability skills. That tiny gap under the shed? Check it.

□ LOOK WHEN IT'S DARK

Cats will often wait until it's dark to search for food. At this time, your cat is also more likely to hear your calls and to respond. Take a flashlight to look in bushes, under cars etc where he or she may be hiding.

□ TEMPT HER BACK

Cats have a strong sense of smell, so leaving out a tasty treat such as tuna might be enough to tempt her back. Do it at the same time every night, then try to keep watch from a distance. (Some people even place a baby monitor near the food so they won't miss her if she returns). If you see it's your cat and you need help catching her, we may be able to help you set up a trap cage.

□ CONTACT LOCAL VETS & RESCUE CENTRES

Somebody may have brought your cat in. If your cat is microchipped, contact PETLOG, who may be able to help with the search.

D PUT UP POSTERS

Local shops and community centres will often be happy to put them up. People do take notice. If you need help with creating a poster, we can provide you with a template.

□ NEVER GIVE UP HOPE

Cats are driven by strong survival instincts and can survive a long time on their own. As we've reported in previous issues, cats are often reunited with their owners, months or even years after they've gone missing.
